Cedar Mill Suspends
SEASIDE, Ore.—The Thompson Kelly White cedar mill on the north Mendocino water front suspended today that operations would be suspended for the present, while federal bank examiners check the books of the First National bank of Seaside, which closed its doors this week. It is understood that the Thompson Kelly company is included in the suspended bank's more than \$400,000 of assets and that the bank is in liquidation.

'BAGDAD' FILM OUTSTANDING

A huge fairy tale with Douglas Fairbanks as the central figure appeared on the Arcadia screen for the first time yesterday in "The Thief of Bagdad." Fairy tale, yes, but a wonderfully pleasing one—featuring throughout a love story that is, after all, the main theme in the film.

The spectacular and unreal play an important part in the picture, including the flying carpet, the flying horse, the magic apple, the invisible clock and what not. Doubt surrounds the possibility of such a feat—slaying dragons, gigantic spiders, and what not.

Interest is sustained throughout and the strong plot is embellished with beautiful backgrounds—oriental cities and lavish interior scenes. A more beautiful picture could only be produced by turning to natural colors.

The Arcadia was filled almost to capacity last night and large crowds are anticipated tonight, Wednesday and Thursday.

Huge Floating Home For Airships Launched

steam power of all the ships in the navy just a few decades ago; her vast living deck is long enough and broad enough to hold two old-time battleships end to end.

And yet the ship is just a monster experiment with the newest form of auxiliary naval power, air power. Her future is written in interrogation points, so far as naval aspects at home or abroad are concerned; it depends upon actual experience with the launching into the air and landing again of the 72 airships that make up her real offensive armament.

The ship herself is just a fast, lightly armed but almost invulnerable transport to get her deadly brood of warships out where they can rain bombs on enemy battle fleets or batteries.

The original plan for the Saratoga would have set her in the water some years ago as one of a fleet of six of the biggest, fastest and most heavily armed battle cruisers ever designed. She would have looked every inch a fighting ship, the whole 538 feet of her length.

Redesigned an aircraft transport, however, the Saratoga will be one of the strongest in appearance that has ever come down to the sea. All the hampers have gone by the board to leave only the vast flying deck, running her whole length and spreading outwards to an extreme breadth of 105 feet. Crowded over to one side of that deck will be the reduced compass of her decks, a cramped navigating bridge, and a stumpy mast to rear her wireless aerial aloft. She will look when completed, like a monster floating target with its mangled deck and all the symmetry and beauty of the line that would have marked an cruiser will be lacking.

But in the 22 heavy bombers and 40 combat and other types of aircraft designed to clear the air from the decks of the big craft, the Saratoga will carry a potential destructive force far greater than would have been the power of her guns. She will have enough explosives in reserve to re-ignite the target after they have dropped charges that would wreck a city. She will carry machine guns and expert mechanics by the score to keep her air brood in fighting trim. She will carry enough gasoline and oil to keep all the motor cars of a big town in operation for a week, and she will have every appliance that naval ingenuity has yet devised to assist the planes when they set out on their grim mission of destruction.

Speed is Asset
The speed of the ship is her greatest asset. She will be able to dash through any but the heaviest seas at a rate almost equivalent to a railroad speed of 30 miles an hour. Given that speed and the engine power and fuel capacity to maintain it hour after hour, the carrier could range far ahead of the battle fleet and then project her air flotilla another 200 or more miles farther to strike the first blow at an approaching enemy. She will be ten times faster than the fastest battleship, and only the most invulnerable cruisers or destroyers could keep pace with her.

The navy has no chance yet to practice with any such weapon as

able. The slow, cumbersome and improvised second line carrier so far in service have been able barely to furnish a hint of what such a ship as the Saratoga might be expected to accomplish. Manufacturers in which function have been almost entirely constructive with most of the fleet and carrier elements imagined rather than real. But during the 1926-27 drills and war games, with the Saratoga and her gigantic sister, the Lexington, in commission, there will be real tryouts under war conditions, and it is from them that final judgment will be drawn on the place of carriers in future battle formations.

It would mean to close the stagnation period in real estate in Oregon for it would bring people here with means to do things just as it has in Florida. We do not need more poor people in this state but we do need wealth to develop the state and install more industry, for the farm must have a coast market for its products under present high cost of railroad operation which causes a freight rate that prevents agricultural products of Oregon from crossing the desert to eastern markets. The only way to get that industry is to attract capital, and the only way to attract capital is to bid for it just as Florida has done with market success.

Predicts Fight
"Of course the politician who has misled people for fifteen years in order to keep himself before the public eye, will fight hard to prevent favorable consideration of anything that opposes the pet hobby horse which has carried him safely into office in the past. Of course the radical who believes in tearing down and waiting calmly rather than attempting to find a way back to prosperity will oppose this because the calamity howler is never so happy as when

he can look people in the face and tell them they are broke and ruined. But that does not build a country. Real estate and business activity builds, and to get that we must have people with means who will appreciate what the state offers. Any effort to recall one who has played fairly, who has stood out for what he thinks is right, and for the best interests of the state and district will be related with all the energy I possess for I deny at all times the charge that I have been untrue to the trust imposed in me by a majority of the voters of Union and Willowa counties."
