## FLAX GROWING FAVORED

MEMPHISVILLE, Ore. — "I am anxious to correct the impression gained in Yamhill county that that county was left out of my survey as a flax-producing section," stated Professor G. H. Hyslop, of Oregon Agricultural college, department station. "As a matter of fact Yamhill county was placed at the head of the list with 24,000 acres suitable for the growing of flax."

Interest in flax growing in Yamhill county has been shown for some weeks and recently the chairman of commerce appointed a committee to investigate the possibilities. A Salem newspaper account of the flax soil survey made by Mr. Hyslop, dampened the ardor of local men, however, by leaving this county entirely out of the findings. ## To Chase Bandits in Their Own Speed Boats

WASHINGTON, (AP)—The specially designed speed boats which have become common in the illegal delivery traffic between Rum Row and the coast, are to be pressed into service, whenever captured, in the war to enforce the blockade under regulations now being prepared in the treasury department.

Acting under authority of a statute enacted in the closing days of the 65th Congress, the department is preparing to utilize the authority therein conferred to use vessels and vehicles seized in the process of enforcing the Volstead act.

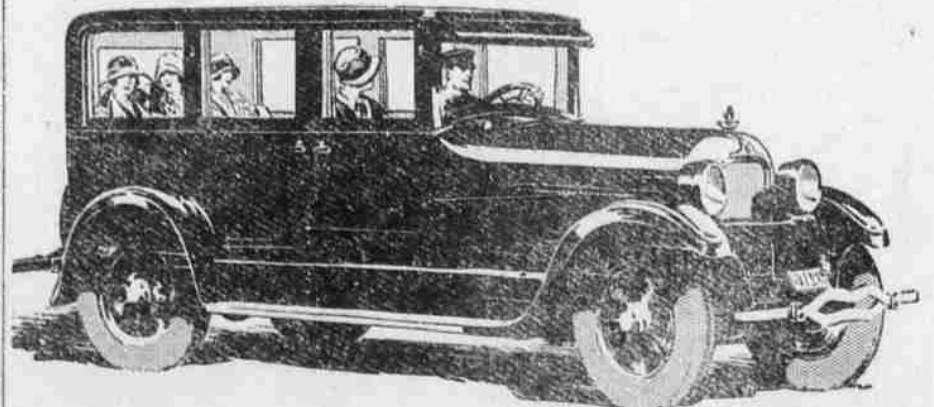

## TWO LAUNCHED MYSTIC SHRINE

LOS ANGELES.—It is commonly believed that the Order of the Mystic Shrine was founded by William J. Florence, a noted American actor, and it is so indicated on his tombstone in Greenwood cemetery, Brooklyn, N. Y., which reads:

Wm. J. Florence Author, Actor and Dramatist Born Albany, N. Y. July 26, 1821 Died Philadelphia, Nov. 18, 1892 Founder in America of the Order of the Nobles of the Mystic Shrine F. and A. M.

But the original ritual of the Shrine is in the handwriting of Mr. Walter M. Fleming and bears this inscription:

The First Complete Ritual of the Ancient Arabic Order of the Nobles of the Mystic Shrine. Written for the Establishment of the Order in the Western Hemisphere by

Walter M. Fleming, M. D. In the bulletin of Al Masakah Shrine Temple of this city, it is stated that a report was made to the Imperial Council during the session at Indianapolis in 1919, by a committee of which William H. Melish, of Cincinnati, was the chairman. This report was that

the Shrine had two founders.

The Fleming was a noted Masonic scholar and a leading spirit among the group of ardent Masons and good fellows, who foregathered from 1896 to 1898 at Kalerbocker cottage, on Sixth avenue, below Twenty-eighth street, New York, which subsequently became Monahan's uptown restaurant. "Billy" Florence was his friend and comrade. The officially accepted explanation is that the Shrine idea crystallized in this informal Masonic club.

The official statement says: "The Order of the Nobles of the Mystic Shrine is an American institution which uses Oriental paraphernalia, signs, tokens, etc., for its own purpose. The motives of those who originated the Shrine, in adopting these Arabic and Egyptian symbols are not known with any certainty, but from the character of the gentlemen who first selected them and used them, we feel we are truthfully saying that they were used for historical purposes."

The report further stated: "Florence was a noted actor. Fleming was a noted Masonic scholar. And a study of the different sections of the ritual indicates that illustrates the mind of both the actor and the Masonic scholar. In the ritualistic work it is seen the gorgeous Oriental display that delights the actor, while the mystical, rhythmic of the Oriental religions appealed to the scholar. Mason; so that you had in these two men a combination which was peculiarly fitted to found an order that would appeal to Masons."

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
