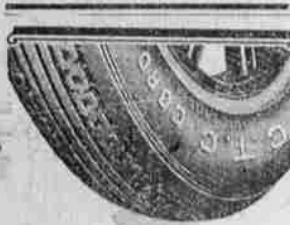

PENDLETON, Ore. (Special)—The Pendleton high school track team is beginning to shape up, according to Coach Homer C. Taylor and local track and field fans will have an opportunity to get a line on the abilities of the various high school entrants next Saturday afternoon the occasion being the annual interschool meet.

The affair will be staged at the Hound-Tri grounds. The high school eudorath burners have a rather heavy schedule ahead of them and more interest than usual is being evidenced by those trying out for the squad.

The hall is officially started rolling next Saturday afternoon with the interschool meet. La Grande comes here for a dual meet April 24 while the county meet is to be held in Pendleton May 2. The Eastern Oregon meet is scheduled for La Grande on May 19 while Waila Waila comes here for a dual engagement some time during the month.

Despite the fact that prospects were very "hazy" earlier in the year present conditions indicate that Pendleton will be represented by a fairly strong aggregation. In the quarter mile, Hayward Fager is showing a lot of stuff with Landrum, Francis McGee, Christenson, Raymond, Robbins trying the dashes. Lays McGee is going better than ever in the century, the broad jump and hurdles while Jack Boynton, Hartwood, Evans and Car are coming along in the half mile.

In the weights Joe Holaday and Bill Newton are looking good while Cliff Christenson shows strength in the hurdles and high jump as well as the dashes. Others who are out and who bear considerable promise are Silver, Albin, Benjamin, Walters, Ray, Kenaine and Asher. Ray and Kenaine bear the brunt in the mile run.

Money was not the only thing that caused Johnson to rejoin his old club. His love for the game was an even stronger influence.

A partner was to assist Johnson in the act and supply the comedy to put it over. When I asked Johnson why he turned down the opportunity, his reply was brief and decidedly to the point: "I'm a ball player, not an actor. When people pay money to see me, I want to give them a run for it. As an actor I would be the 'bank,' and my conscience wouldn't let me get away with it."

For Johnson to be unable to win consistently this year would be one of the tragedies of baseball. I would hate to see it happen.
