BROCCOLI TO BE PLANTED
ROSENBERG, Ore. — In spite of heavy losses suffered by broccoli growers in the Umpqua valley as a result of the cold weather in December, there will be a greater average set out to this vegetable than ever before, according to managers reported. The various growers' organizations have been checking up with their members and find that the plantings during the summer and fall will exceed any year since the industry was established.

The best variety of this year's crop left Riddle, making 64 for the season. The entire crop this year, except for one carload, was raised in the Myrtle creek and Riddle vicinities. Certification of seed and extensive experiments to test soil and the cold resisting qualities resulting from use of acid phosphate on broccoli land will be two important experiments conducted during the coming winter, and are expected to be much benefit to the industry.

EASY LESSONS IN AUCTION BRIDGE

What is the most valuable quality that a person can possess, to make him or her a successful auction player? No doubt you will answer, "good sense," but the writer in a contrary opinion. A good, equitable disposition is worth more at the card table than any other quality. The world begs a grin and has no use for a scowl. Apply this rule to the auction table and you will soon get the point. It's the player who can take his losses and bid breaks with a grin, who goes there. He isn't ruffled himself and what he even says to the point, he doesn't irritate his partner. Think over in your own mind how many tricks you have lost, either by losing your own temper or causing your partner to lose his. Loss of temper inevitably means loss of tricks. Every one cannot be an expert, but everyone can and should be an agreeable player. Keep your temper and your grin and the tricks will take care of themselves. There's nothing like a good temper as a sound foundation for successful play. If you don't believe it, try it out, not for one night, or one week but for several months. If you haven't materially improved your play and your bank account by that time, then I will be very much surprised. Remember, the smile wins at the auction table as it does everywhere else.

The example hands given in past week's articles have aroused considerable interest and much favorable comment. Compare the writer's analysis with your own and, if in doubt, don't hesitate to write the editor. Clear up your difficulties and your game will soon improve.

Hand No. 1
Hearts—3
Clubs—A, Q, J, 7, 4
Diamonds—5, 6, 5, 2
Spades—K, Q, J

That probably means that he is short of diamonds and if so, it is very necessary to lead trumps and prevent Y from trumping A's good diamonds. As a matter of fact, the lead of the spade is the only one that will defeat the contract. If A opens the club, Y-Z will just make their contract. Hearts—None
Clubs—A, J, 10, 7, 2
Diamonds—K, Q, J, 8, 7, 5
Spades—K, 8

No score; Z dealt and bid one diamond. A bid two hearts. Y one-trump, and B two hearts. What should Z now do with the foregoing hand? Z should unquestionably bid three clubs and force his partner to choose between clubs and diamonds. If Y has anything that looks like a no-trump Z should make game either in diamonds or clubs. In the actual play, Z bid two no-trump and Y-Z failed to make game, while at diamonds they could have made five odd. With a two suit hand of this type, always bid both suits if you get the chance.

Sister Mary's Kitchen
BY SISTER MARY

Breakfast
Stewed Rhubarb, scrambled eggs with rice, crisp whole wheat toast, milk, coffee.

Luncheon
Cream of mushroom soup, toasted crackers, spring salad, brown bread and butter sandwiches, Spanish cream, walnut crackers, milk, tea.

Dinner
Cream of tomato soup, broiled fish, lemon butter, scalloped potatoes, buttered string beans, French onion, rhubarb frappe, sponge cake, milk, coffee.

No cereal is planned for breakfast, but since the scrambled eggs with rice combined with the whole wheat toast furnish the nutrients found in a cereal as well as a necessary protein.

While a child less than four years of age should be served cereal for his breakfast rather than the scrambled egg combination a child of four years may eat the breakfast suggested without a cereal being specially prepared for him.

Cream of Mushroom Soup
One-half pound mushrooms, 4 tablespoons butter, 1 teaspoon minced onion, 4 cups white stock of water, 1 cup cream, 2 tablespoons flour, salt and pepper, 2 eggs (yolks).

Chop mushrooms. Melt three tablespoons of the butter and cook mushrooms and onion over a low fire for five minutes. A few mushrooms should be saved after straining to garnish the soup. Add stock or water to mushrooms and simmer until soft. Rub through a sieve. Blend remaining butter and flour.
