Kansas Discontinues Bond Tax Exemption

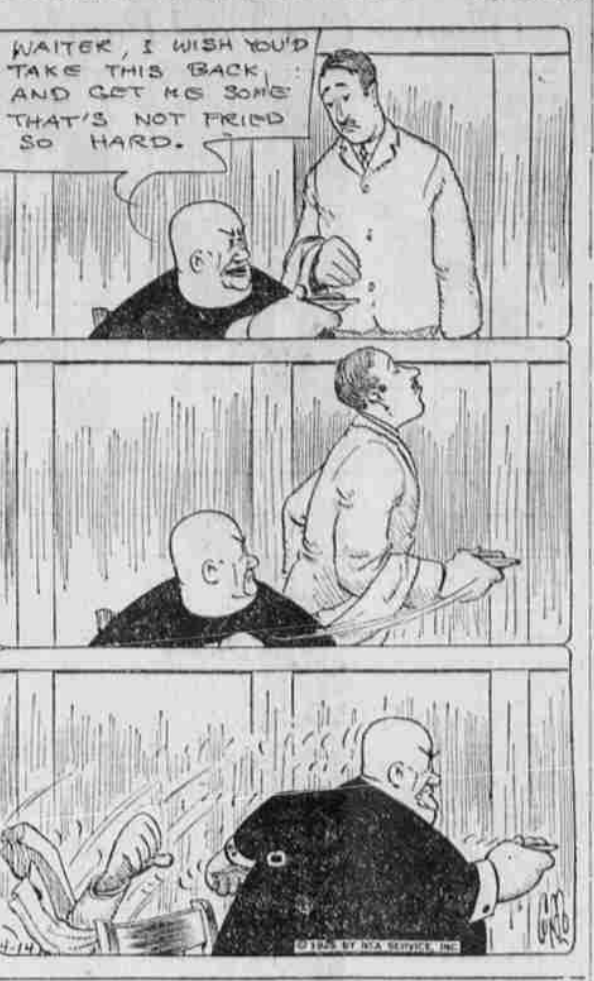

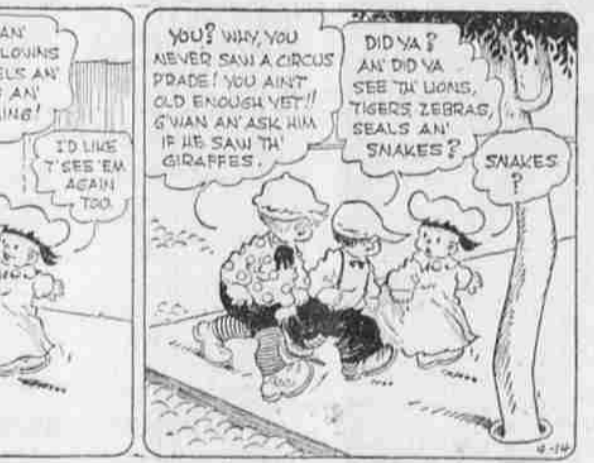
"Top of the World" At Star Wednesday And Thursday.

Anna Q. Nilsson, James Kirkwood, Raymond Hatton and Stuart Lewis—this is the featured quartet of notable players who appear in Paramount's production of Ethel M. Dell's widely-read novel, "The Top of the World," at the Star Wednesday and Thursday.

Because of the amazing popularity of her books, of which millions of copies have been sold, Ethel M. Dell deservedly ranks with such top-notch authors as Zane Grey, James Oliver Curwood and Harold Bell Wright. Her stories are colorful, packed with tense, swift moving action and lend themselves admirably to visualization on the screen. In this instance, the scenario writer, Jack Cunningham, has caught all the essential drama and flavor of the story, which George Melford has translated to the silver sheet with all the directorial mastery that has made him one of the most successful producers in the business. Inasmuch as most of the action takes place out on the African veldt, there are extraordinary opportunities for unusual settings and backgrounds. None of these has been overlooked, but Melford, very wisely, has made the story and characterization the dominating features. Although the plot deals with the "eternal triangle" theme, it strikes out along brand new lines, developing several dramatically unique situations, sweeps along to a "crushing climax, and then, for good measure, adds at least two more half-raising thrills before it comes to a glorious finish. The acting of the individual

players deserves honorable mention. Nilsson has a strong, forceful part which demands every ounce of histrionic ability she possesses. Kirkwood carries a double acting burden in the picture since he plays a dual role—the two cousins who resemble each other physically but are different mentally, morally and spiritually. It is a remarkable character transition, all the more emphasized by the astonishing photographic effects. Hatton has comparatively little to do but he does this bit with the skill of a veteran actor. Sheldon Lewis, as usual, plays a villainous role so effectively that you feel like hissing him! The minor characters were carefully chosen and acquit themselves with distinction.
