The construction work on the rebuilding of the logging road of the Bowman-Hicks Lumber company between here and their field of operations in the north woods is reported to be going forward very rapidly.

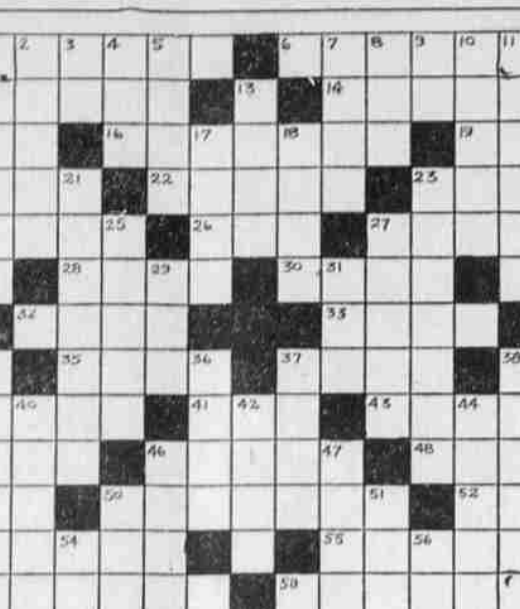
