and which half cooled. Let cool. Melt butter, stir in flour and slowly add milk, stirring constantly. Season with salt and paprika and add the well-beaten yolk of egg. Remove from the fire and stir in rice. Put mixture into a well buttered pan, making a layer or about 1/4 inch thick. Cover with oiled paper and put a weight on top. Let stand until cold and firm. Remove from pan and cut into rounds, removing centers to form cranks. Moist in crumbs, dip in egg slightly beaten with one tablespoon milk and roll again in crumbs. Brown over with melted butter and brown in a moderate oven. Fill with shrimp, combined with white sauce and served.
