Famous Chinese Arsenal May Recieve Auto Factory

SHANGHAI (AP)—Tired of armed conflict, and realizing that men cannot fight without rifles, revolvers and ammunition, Shanghai has welcomed a project to turn the Klingman Arsenal into a motor car factory. Deprived of this local source of weapons, warring factions may become more peaceful, it is argued.

The arsenal was built some 50 years ago, near Shanghai, and for half a century it has been the objective of much strife and many warlike clashes. Recent orders from Peking said the arms making machinery in the arsenal should be removed from the Shanghai district, possibly to Nanking, and that the building be turned over to the Shanghai chamber of commerce for commercial uses. Thereafter came the proposal that China's first automobile factory be inaugurated in the old arsenal, and Canton capitalists have the matter under favorable consideration.

MIDWEST HAS MANY STORMS

WASHINGTON (AP)—The varieties of tornado, one variety of which recently snuffed out upward of 500 lives in the middle west, have almost completely baffled the researchers of science. The suddenness with which they strike and the destructive force of their attack, have made scientific study extremely difficult.

Prof. William J. Humphreys, of the weather bureau, describes a tornado as "a violent rotating storm of small dimensions." The chances are, he says, that not once in 1,000 years would a tornado hit the same spot twice.

The name tornado originally was applied to a violent thunderstorm on the west coast of Africa. The variety of storm now called by that name, however, is peculiar to the Mississippi valley region of the United States, and rarely occurs in any other part of the world. Dr. Humphreys' records show that it does not occur west of Denver; is found only occasionally in southern Canada; is rare in eastern part of the United States, and is not distinctive in or east of the Allegheny mountains, except in Alabama and Georgia.

The explanation is that the rocky mountains, extending generally north and south, guide the cold air draining to the south from the Canadian Rocky region. The drift of winds comes across the warm waters of the Gulf of Mexico and strikes north across the United States. The meeting of these cold and warm currents of air starts up a rotation between them, Dr. Humphreys explains, adding that no other part of the world has that geographic configuration existing in the Rocky-Gulf area.

The passage of these currents establishes violent rotations at cloud levels and the whirl starts down to the bottom, usually from a level of less than a mile above the earth, to the ground.

The tornado only occurs in connection with a big rain or snow-bringing storm and is usually from 1,000 to 1,500 feet wide.

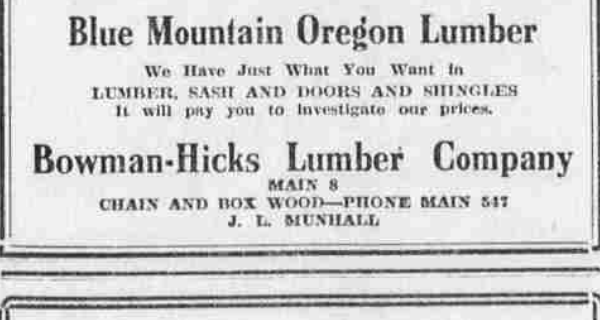
