BETTER PITCHING
A majority of the major league managers with whom I talked in the south are of the opinion that the pitching will be much improved this season.

While none of them offer any definite or logical reasons for their opinion, they are positive in their statements that hitting will be considerably curtailed this summer.

Most of them agree that hitting and pitching are in a cycle. There is a belief that hitting has for a time almost ended its period of complete supremacy and that pitching is to come to the front.

It is the history of baseball that the supremacy of hitting or pitching usually is limited. The belief is that pitching is due for a comeback.

It is just possible that the pitchers have finally reached the point of effectiveness where they can combat the far-reaching effects of the bally ball.

CURVE BALL IDEA
While I feel that the batsman will continue to have a fairly comfortable edge in the matter of supremacy this year, I do look for improved pitching.

My reason for this is due to the great revival of the curve ball. As far back as five years ago it was made apparent that the successful big league pitcher must have not only a change of pace but a good curve.

The news traveled quickly to the minors and pitchers everywhere began paying attention to their curve ball. This is shown by the work of many highly touted minor league pitchers. In a great many cases the curve is their chief asset.

Curve ball pitching is going to shrink batting averages. I feel that I am conservative when I say the majors has improved 25 per cent in three years.

SOUTHWAY CRAZE
It is a well known fact that several managers are planting their hopes for success on a well-kept, speed left-handed staff.

Several managers have as many as four southpaws, possessing the ability to be used as regulars. It is the intention of such managers no doubt to southpaw their respective leagues into submission.

There is something about the southpaw that seems to cause certain clubs to win before the battle even starts. The moment the players observe a crack left-hander warming up for the opposition they are ready to give up.

MELLOR WINS MARATHON

BOSTON (By the Associated Press)—Charles L. Mellor, Illinois A. C., won the twenty-mile Boston A. C. marathon road race Monday, defeating Charles Deane, four times winner of the event and holder of the world's record, for the distance by 100 yards. His time was 7:33.43.

Endurance Runs to Show Horse's Stamina

WASHINGTON (AP)—Interest in horse endurance is believed by members of the American Remount association to be in the ascendant. They point to the three big endurance rides for 1925 to Idaho, Colorado and Vermont as proof.

At Boise, Idaho, some time in September, a 300-mile endurance test is to be held, under the auspices of the Boise Chamber of Commerce and the adjutant general of the Idaho National Guard.

Members of the American Remount association expect the event to be similar to that held there last year, when it occupied the week of Sept. 24, was based on Boise and consisted of a 60-mile stretch for five consecutive days.

The Colorado endurance ride will be held at Breckenridge, Colorado Springs, Sept. 21-25, inclusive. This event also will be over a total 300-mile course, extending 60 miles each day for five days.

Later in the fall, on Oct. 19, at a yet undecided point in Vermont the 1925 eastern endurance ride will begin. Brandon, N. C., is being favored in the selection by a special committee which has the location in hand. Regulations will be similar to those which governed last year's ride, except the reduction in weight from 225 to 200 pounds.

This ride also will be 300 miles total, divided into five days of 60 miles each. An effort is being made to make it international this year, by securing Canadian entries.

Oregon has played no practice games with outside teams. The two-game series with the Salem Senators at Salem Friday and Saturday was called off because of rain.

Although the Webfooters have lost most of their 1924 lettermen to graduation, the players from last year's freshman team look promising, and Coach Reinhardt expects to have a stronger team than last year.

Jack Bliss of Eugene and George Minnaugh of Portland will be the catchers. Bliss is a letterman, while Minnaugh is playing his first year.

"Skipper" Brooks of Portland, veteran southpaw, Ray Williams and Karl Kaudson, both of Portland, Dave Adolph of Salem, Harry Dutton and Roy Murray, will be on the mound. Brooks and Williams will be the regulars.

Rex Adolph of Salem will be on first; Howard Hobson of Portland on second; Fred West of Portland at short; and Sam Cook and Lynn Jones of Salem, at third. Cook or Jones, Kaudson and Frank Reinhardt of Salem will play in the outfield. Troutman and Burton of Portland and Charlie Orr of Dallas are first string substitutes. Brooks, Williams, Kaudson, Thompson, Cook and Bliss are lettermen.
