Resolution Passed.
 G. L. Larson reviewed the improving of the Old Oregon Trail highway to Oregon, stating that the original intention was to have the highway entirely paved in Oregon, but that only a very small portion was now paved. He pointed out that the Astoria-Portland highway, recently paved, was to be straightened out at a cost of approximately \$200,000 and that the highway commission had refused to pave the Union-La Grande section of the Old Oregon Trail this year because of lack of funds.

Mr. Larson then read a resolution which will be presented to the highway commission this week asking for less expensive repairs on the Astoria-Portland stretch. The resolution was adopted unanimously.

Mr. Larson also stated that plans were under way to form a "Pave-the-Old-Oregon-Trail" committee with members in 18 towns in Oregon.

Several announcements were made, including one in reference to La Grande's music week, which will be held early in May. The chamber of commerce endorsed the plan by a unanimous vote.

Hugh E. Brady was chairman of the meeting today.

Installs Novel Floor In Display Window

Believing in the old saying of "nothing what they preach the W. H. Bohmkamp company, decorators for Armstrong Lumber, terms, who advocate linoleum for every room in the house, have just finished installing a new floor of Gray Joseph linoleum with a plain black border in their furniture show windows.

In order to show the method of laying the window was left unarranged during the operation which consisted of erecting an extra heavy deadening felt to the floor and then cementing the linoleum to the felt. The black border was laid last and all seams were finished with a water proof cement which makes a very practical and durable installation. After completion of the laying the entire floor was waxed with Johnson's liquid wax and then polished.

RAIN SETS APRIL RECORD

ROSEBURG, Ore.—April rain records for all years since 1853 were surpassed when the local weather bureau station recorded a total rainfall for the month up to date of 4 inches. In the past 26 hours the precipitation totaled 1.29 inches, setting a new storm record for that period of time during the month of April. The heaviest rainfall for April in the 46 years the station has been located in Roseburg was slightly in excess of 5 inches.
