**War Veterans Help In Recording History**

WASHINGTON (AP)—The war department's request last November for historical data from individuals to shed official light on activities of the World War has brought fruitful results.

The department has in mind the compiling of an official history of the great conflict in future years, and is buying itself now with obtaining information on it from active participants, while memories are still fresh. From all over the United States, and even from Canada, have come several hundred official documents, in response to the department's request. These include several important maps, showing the location of units at various stages of the war.

A pictorial record of the war is being made in the files of the signal corps, and motion pictures of many phases of the great struggle are preserved in its archives.

If there is any trouble the Irish war files share. A bulletin paper is printing crossword puzzles.

**Steps Taken to Effect Better Lighting in Schools**

**NEW YORK (AP)**—The National Committee for the Prevention of Blindness, seeking the protection of school children from eye strain, is undertaking to ascertain every school teacher in the United States with the permission of correct lighting. To this end it will send to the superintendent of schools in every state, county and city having a school population of 25,000 or more a communication based on the code of lighting school buildings prepared by experts, and approved as the American standard.

The committee says its studies indicate that 12 per cent of American school children have defective vision.

**German Emigration Drops.** BERLIN (AP)—Emigration of emigrants has been checked on German emigration. During 1922 Germans who left to establish homes in other parts of the world numbered 135,000, while in 1924 the number dropped to 67,000. North America still is the favorite destination of the emigrants.
