LABOR SUPPLY, DEMAND RIGHT

PROCLAMATION, Ore. (Special) - That the demand for labor in most industries of the west coast is now more nearly balanced than it has been since early last fall, is indicated by reports from 41 employment service offices in various northwestern cities received at the headquarters here today. There are few experienced loggers out of work in any district.

Estimate by the state in some inland Empire rivers has forced several sawmills to close temporarily. Woods work there is going ahead steadily, the reports show, and skilled woodmen are quite generally employed. Condensed reports from the 41 offices follow:

Forest - Ore. - The two mills of the Booth-Kelly Lumber company, Springfield and Weeding, both of which have recently been operating but four days per week, have returned to a five-day cutting program. Farm labor in the Eugene district is well employed. Building and construction is at about normal for this time of year. There is plenty of help here to meet all current demands.

Booth-Kelly - Logging along the Columbia river and adjacent districts about 64 per cent of capacity. Labor turnover in the camps has increased. There are practically no experienced loggers out of work in this district. There has been a slight shifting of sawmill workers. The Pacific Spruce corporation's mill at Toledo has returned to a five-day week following two weeks of four-day operation. There is still a large demand for farm workers. Calls for construction men are fewer but steady.

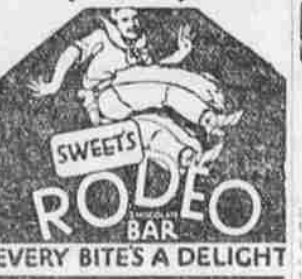
Aberdeen - Camp and sawmill labor turnover during the past week has been very low and there has been little demand for labor of any kind. Logging is below normal. Recent arrivals of itinerant laborers on Grays Harbor have created a small surplus of help here.

Tacoma - Unsettled weather during the past week slowed logging and outdoor construction work. Lumber production in this district continues to be greatly curtailed. There are few skilled workers out of employment here. Seattle - Some new paying work within the city and a steady demand for construction workers from outside points last week further reduced the number of unemployed here. A noticeable falling off in the demand for loggers was noted. Some camps have laid off fallers and buckers. Labor turnover in sawmills is no greater than normal.

Spokane - High water last week forced many large sawmills and some plants to close and several hundred men were thrown out of work temporarily. Among the plants closing are included the Whiton at St. Joe, Russell & Pugh, Sprague, the Export at Harrison, and the Blackfoot at Chew's dam. It is thought that the high water peak has been reached and that about now down river remains work shortly.

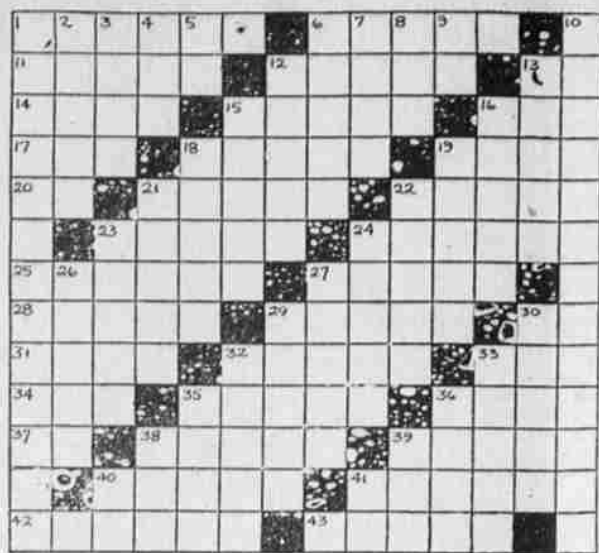

The rains and grates are making a rapid growth, and with the ground becoming well soaked at this season of the year, the outlook is very bright.

(Continued from Page One) very. Publication of details or photographs other than those given out by the departments themselves will be prohibited, if officials have their way.

The trouble with this program is how to make it effective without the cooperation of the press—which isn't all of it likely to be willing to cooperate. In war time it could be done, of course. Even in peace time it can be done in some old world countries, where military has a tighter grip than here. But in the United States, except when war is on, if the newspapers can get details and pictures, unless new laws are passed, no means exists of preventing their publication. And a battleship, for instance, can't very well be bombed in an enclosed space, from which reporters and photographers can be excluded.

This question came up in connection with the sinking of the Washington. It was going to be secret, Commander Halsey Powell of "navy press relations" announced.

"Suppose," suggested one of the newspaper men, "a press photographer goes up in a private plane and takes his own picture. Would you shoot him down?"

"Oh, my no," Commander Powell exclaimed. "We couldn't do that."
