Desmond's New Film Promises Entertainment At the Star.

The inadvisability of jumping at conclusions is stressed with serious comedy effect in "Straight Through" starring William Desmond and to be screened in the Star Theatre today. Desmond is cast as Good Deed O'Day, a reformed bad man who believes that by doing good deeds he can offset the bad deeds that were so frequent in his past.

In one instance O'Day comes upon a man and a woman in terrible struggle and immediately possesses on the man, whom he whips after a hard fight, in which both are considerably moused up. By this time the woman has vanished and the man explains that the woman has taken all his money and is on the way to elope with a worthless sweetheart. This is only one of the misdirected efforts of Good Deed O'Day, the part personated by Desmond.

Becoming superintendent of a mine, O'Day falls in love with the sister of the mine owner, but one day the mine owner comes home from Denver with a bride, recognized by O'Day as the former consort of a gambler and the woman responsible for O'Day's reformation. The bride begs O'Day not to expose her and, believing in her promises to go straight, decides to watch her.

The woman resumes her friendship with the gambler, whose consort she was, and in his efforts to protect the good name of his friend O'Day comes under the suspicion of the woman he loves and becomes involved in a series of misadventures that culminate in his being accused of having shot the mine owner.

The supporting cast in this dramatic story includes Marguerite Clayton, Ruth Stonehouse, Claude Payton, Albert J. Smith, Bill Grillo, Frank Brownlee and George Marion. Arthur Rosson directed. He made most of Desmond's recent successes.

Colleen Moore Stars In "So Big" At Arcade Thursday.

Colleen Moore has been called the "living library" of Hollywood because she has produced screen versions of so many popular novels.

Her latest picture, "So Big," is an adaptation from Edna Ferber's "best seller" to be shown at the Arcade theatre Thursday. Prior to this, she produced "Painting Youth," "The Sky Pilot," "The Lotus Eaters," "The Huntress" and numerous others.

In "So Big," Miss Moore is declared to have done her best screen work. The story, based on life in the old Dutch settlement near Chicago in the latter part of the past century, gets her away from the frivolous flapper roles with which she has been associated. It presents her as the sister of a stolid Dutch farmer, toiling amidst the cabbages and radishes of a truck garden.

A baby son is all that makes her life worth while and, as she toils, she visualizes the time when he will become "so-o-o big" in this world of affairs.

It is a surprising role for young Miss Moore, and it grows more surprising as, with the passage of years, she is seen slowly transforming into a middle-aged woman. Nothing could be so remote from the gay and giddy flapper of yesterday. The story permits the mother to all but realize her life's ambition. Her baby, now a man, stands at the portals of fame as an archi-

lect. But as he does so, a woman enters his life—a married woman of wealth who would drag him into disgrace and failure through an elopement.

It is then Miss Moore, rushing to the rescue of her baby-man, facing his would-be disperser and finally dragging him back to the pathway of her ambitions, reaches the pinnacle of emotional heights. Previous critics of the film say nothing like it has ever been screened.

First National has relieved the tennesseeness of the drama with a world of good comedy, based upon the rural antics of the Dutch farmers. A notable supporting cast, including Wallace Beery, Phyllis Haver, Ford Sterling, John Bowers, Ben Lyon, Dot Farley and others, was given the picture to attain this.

"Broken Barriers" At Sherrys Today And Tomorrow.

"Broken Barriers," Reginald Barker's new special production for Metro, is to play at the Sherry theatre for a run of two days, beginning today. George Fawcett appears as the father of the heroine, whose sister in the picture is played by Ruth Stonehouse, a favorite star some years ago, who in this picture makes her return to the screen after a long absence.
