Solution of Ice Box Cares May Come Soon

STOCKHOLM (AP).—For inventing a new kind of domestic ice box, two Swedish engineers have received from the Swedish Technological society its highest award, the Polhem medal, granted only a dozen times in the last 50 years.

The device has been described by a technical expert as solving in a clever manner the difficult problem of constructing a low-priced, strong and easily managed artificial refrigerator for household use.

The machine, patented in all countries, is described as very simple. It consists of three communicating metal cylinders, containing certain gases and chemicals which are set in motion by a small flame or electric connection. When heated at one end it gives out cold at the other. With the heat obtained from 41 cubic feet of gas it refrigerates the equivalent of 50 pounds of ice, and for ordinary household purposes it is run only six hours out of the twenty-four.

NO TRACE OF MISSING SHIPS

WASHINGTON (AP).—More than 1,000 American naval men have gone down to watery graves in a score of vessels that have disappeared from the face of the earth, without a trace. From the brig Reptail, lost in September, 1777, to the tug Conestoga, that disappeared in the Pacific in 1921, there is a chapter of naval history on which the navy department is able to throw but little light.

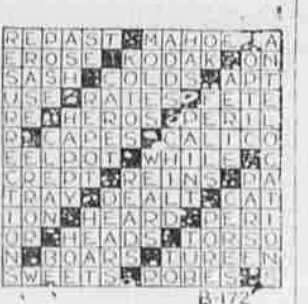
Outstanding among the unaccounted for craft in modern days is the naval collier Cyclops, concerning which there is a mass of fanciful theory, but no official fact. During a wide stretch of years from the Civil War period to nearly the World War era, naval armaments are devoid of entries concerning lost ships. Three have vanished from the seas since the beginning of the present century, however, in spite of the much vaunted safety to be found in modern apparatus of communication. Many of the lost ships were last heard of in the vicinity of the West Indies.

The department has listed these vessels as missing, without a trace, and abandoned hope for their recovery:

- Reptail, lost September, 1777; General Gates, 1777; Haratoga, 1781; Insurance, 1800; Pickering, 1800; Hamilton, 1822; Wasp III, 1814; Epervier, 1815; Lynx, 1824; Wildcat, 1829; Hornet, 1829; Sylph II, 1839; Sea Gull, 1839; Grampus, 1842; Jefferson, 1850; Albany I, with 210 men, 1860; Levant II, with 210 men, 1860; tug Nina, sailed from Norfolk and never heard from, 1910; collier Cyclops, with 223 persons comprising 15 officers, 221 men and 57 passengers, sailed March 4, 1919, from Barbadoes, West Indies; and the Conestoga, with four officers and 52 men, from Mare Island, Cal., for Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, 1921.

Naval vessels have searched the seas for tidings of these missing craft but their fate remains a mystery. Naval officers consider the case of the Cyclops unusually puzzling, for she was equipped with radio and apparently encountered no storm, her captain last reporting all well and fair weather. She was 542 feet long, 65 feet beam, and 19,000 tons. Theories exist that the Cyclops was improperly loaded and split in two; that her machinery was disabled and her radio put out of commission and that she was scuttled; and that an enemy submarine destroyed her, but official information regarding her is wholly lacking.

Chinese in Philippines Seek Report of Discriminatory Law

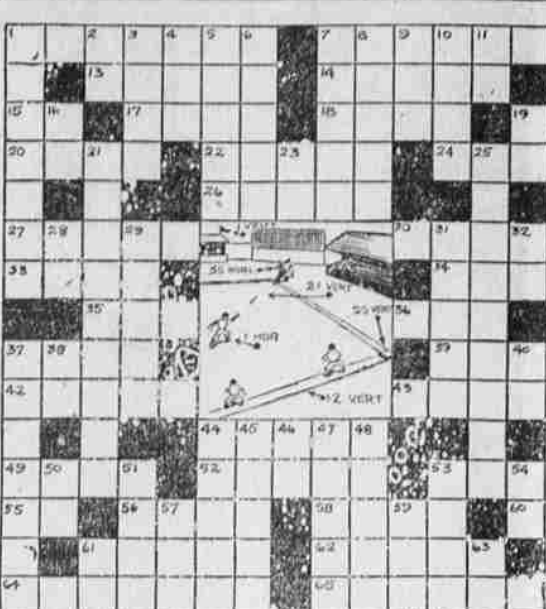
MANILA (AP).—Repeal of the bookkeeping law which has been declared constitutional in a decision by the supreme court, will be sought by Chinese merchants of the Philippines.

The law requires all accounts to be kept in English, Spanish or a Philippine dialect, and the Chinese claim this discriminates against them to such an extent that the enforcement of the measure will drive out of business thousands of small Chinese merchants throughout the islands who are not conversant with any of these languages, and who are unable to employ bookkeepers on account of the expense.

It was stated that if the legislature failed to repeal the law, the Chinese will, on a last resort, carry the case to the United States supreme court.

BRITISH MODEL SCHOOLS AFTER ONES IN SOUTH

RALEIGH, N. C. (AP).—North Carolina which, together with its political subdivisions, has spent approximately \$15,000,000 on negro education during the past four years, including \$4,250,000 in 1924 has become a model for British educators. James W. C. Douglass, who will become director of negro education for the British government in Kenya Colony, East Africa, next fall, will arrive in Raleigh shortly to study North Carolina methods. He will spend the remainder of the present school year here in preparation for the work to which he will be assigned. He will be associated with Prof. N. C. Newbold, director of the Division of Negro Education, which is maintained as a part of the state department of public instruction. North Carolina's expenditures for negro education have increased rapidly during the past few years. The state has made large appropriations to the Negro Agricultural and Technical College at Greensboro, and to the four negro normal schools, for both maintenance and permanent improvements.

Dr. James B. Dudley, president of the Negro Agricultural and Technical college, and Dr. James E. Sheppard, president of Durham college, made vigorous utterances against negro migration when it was at its crest. They urged the members of their race to remain in North Carolina and pointed out what this state was doing for them. They called attention to the fact that North Carolina not only was spending substantial sums of money for the education of their children and young men and women, but that this state afforded them physical safety against mob rule. They had not been a lynching in North Carolina since early in 1921.

Professor Newbold has been invited to Teachers' College of Columbia university will, next winter give a unit course on negro education and he has accepted an invitation to conduct a lecture there.

Insect Pests Ready to Crash American Shores

WASHINGTON (AP).—Millions of dollars now are being spent annually to control plant diseases and insect pests in this country, and prevent the entry of others from foreign lands. The federal horticultural board of the department of agriculture, which has this work in hand, estimates that from 85 to 90 per cent of the real insect pest problems are due to foreign importations. Prominent among the insects are the grape and brown-blot moth, which entered from Europe; the Japanese beetle, from Japan; the cotton boll weevil, from Mexico; the European corn borer, from Europe; and the San Jose scale, from China. Quarantines within the United States itself are maintained, prohibiting for instance, the movement of cotton from isolated points in Texas, where infection has been found; corn and broom corn, sorghums and Sudan grass from infested areas in Vermont, New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio and Michigan, on account of the European corn borer; and in certain counties in New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Delaware, because of the Japanese beetle, which affects farm products between June 15 and Oct. 15. An embargo on Malaga grapes from Spain is maintained because of the presence of the Mediterranean fruit fly. All fruits, except pineapples and bananas, grown in the Hawaiian Islands, are shipped from the American market because of the Mediterranean fruit fly and the melon fly. Several species of Mexican fruits are on the embargo list because of the Mexican fruit fly.

So vigilant is the federal horticultural board to keep these insect pests from American shores that its men go abroad incognito, in coats and hats, green in color for forbidden fruits. A little persuasion is usually sufficient to have the undesirable fruit destroyed; otherwise a customs seal bars their use in the American port.
