FISH REVEAL THEIR AGES BY CIRCLES ON SCALES

SEATTLE, Wash. (AP)—Salmon and trout, like rattlesnakes, have a way of telling their ages, according to John N. Cobb, director of the college of fisheries of the University of Washington.

"Every year adds a series of half circles to the scales of trout and salmon," said Dean Cobb. "Each series is distinguishable from the preceding ones by its size. The lines are similar to those on a cross section of a tree, and the method of telling the age of fish is like that used by woodmen to ascertain ages of trees."

Salmon reveal the amount of food consumed each season. When salmon have a good year with plenty to eat the lines are wider than in lean years.

Experiments now being conducted by Dean Cobb in telling the age of other species of fish.

Oxford Turns Cold Shoulder To Students From China

OXFORD, Eng. (AP)—More than four hundred resident graduate members of Oxford University, including the vice-chancellor and professors, the public orator, 23 heads of colleges and 22 professors and readers have addressed to the foreign secretary a memorial recommending that the British share of the Chinese Boxer indemnity fund be spent exclusively upon educational and medical work in China.

There is no enthusiasm over the proposal that a number of Chinese be admitted in the English universities. The universities are well filled at present, and there is reason to believe that neither doctors nor students really desire the presence or company of a further number of Oriental students.
