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Weather Forecasts Need Reports From Distant Continents

WASHINGTON (AP)—Two additional observation stations, located probably in America and Asia, and accurate recording of the sun's changes of radiation over a period of years will be necessary, in the opinion of Dr. C. E. Abbot, assistant secretary of the Smithsonian Institution and director of its astrophysical observatory, to determine the exact extent to which weather depends upon solar changes.

The sun's heat, Dr. Abbot believes, governs the earth's temperature and rainfall, and a change in it must modify these. The astrophysical observatory began work on the problem in 1922, commencing to observe solar radiation in Washington but the impure atmosphere here necessitated its removal. The institution now maintains observing stations at Mount Harara, Haiti, in Arizona, which has been continuously occupied since October, 1920, and on Mount Montezuma, nearly 10,000 feet high and about 12 miles from Calama, in the inland desert of Chile.

Two additional first-rate stations are desirable, Dr. Abbot believes, at well-separated points in cloudless regions, where winter observa-

WOMAN FIGHT WORD 'OBEY'

LONDON (AP)—Demands that the marriage service, which was "inspired by the ideals of the times of Henry VIII," be revised, have been made upon the National Assembly of the Church of England by the National Union of Societies for Equal Citizenship. The Women's Freedom League also has come out for a change.

The marriage service is antiquated, according to Miss Florence C. Desmond, secretary of the Freedom League, who contends that her organization cannot agree to any formula which indicates less than absolute equality between men and women.

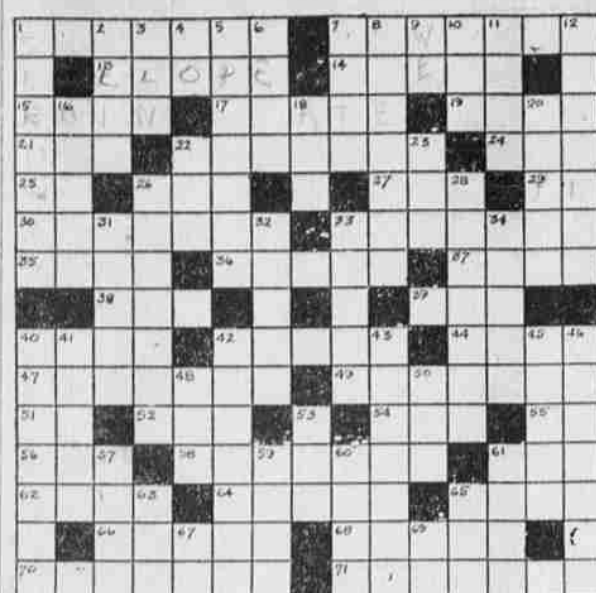
"We do not propose to suggest to the church any particular alternative form of words," said Miss Underwood, "as that is the business of the church and we leave it to the bishops to consider. But we certainly do object to the word 'obey.' It is most absurdly high time that a service was evolved, which, while retaining all the beauty and sacredness of the one now used, would demand precisely the same from one party as from the other."

Decision in Border Oil Cases To Be Handed Down in June

WASHINGTON (AP)—A decision affecting leases valued at millions of dollars in the south half of the Red River oil field, on the Oklahoma-Texas border, is being prepared by Secretary Work and his assistant, John H. Edwards, and will be made public about June 1. Many oil companies with thousands of stockholders in all parts of the country are interested.

Conditions might be more favorable, due to lack of funds at the present time, the Smithsonian Institution is unable to undertake this program. Before selecting sites for the proposed new solar observing stations, Dr. Abbot thinks \$5,000 would be needed to make a preliminary survey. For each new station it would require from \$10,000 to \$15,000 (or original installation, and from \$5,000 to \$12,000 annually for continuous operation, depending on location.

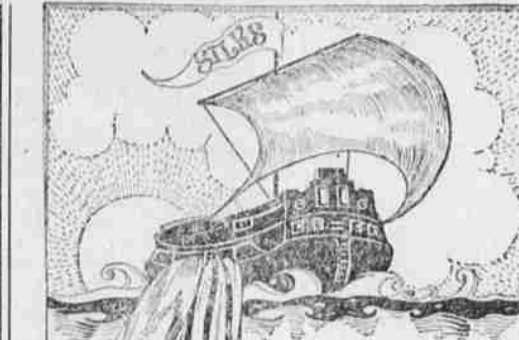
