Iceland Must Renounce Dairy Goods From Paris

REYKJAVIK, Iceland (AP)—Fashionable Icelandic women have had few new fashions from Paris this year, and the modish young men will be able to import any of the flapping Oxford trousers, so much commented on in England. This became for two years Iceland is not to bring in any ready-made clothing. Shoes and all sorts of fabrics also are on the prohibited list.

Practically all luxuries and many necessary articles have been placed on the prohibited list in an effort to stabilize the Icelandic crown. Bread, butter, margarine, cheese, salt meat, pork sausage, green fruit, leather goods, silk, soap, furniture, films, watches, clocks, motorcycles, automobiles and scores of other articles may not be brought into the country.

Officers' Taunts Blamed For Austrian Army Suicides

VIENNA (AP)—Thirty-two suicides in 1924 and eight since the beginning of the year among soldiers of the Austrian army have caused the adoption of measures designed to end the growing morbidity in the ranks.

Investigation and farewell letters says the Arbeiterzeitung, show that the men take their lives because they are systematically harassed and belied at for their republican opinions by officers who are of monarchistic traditions.

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Sister Mary's Kitchen

BY SISTER MARY

Breakfast.
Sliced pineapple, broiled suit codfish, mashed potato cakes, corn bread, maple syrup, milk, coffee, Luncheon.

Scrambled eggs with chipped beef, onion sandwiches, drop muffins, cookies, canned fruit, milk, tea.

Dinner.
Baked stuffed ham, potatoes au gratin, head lettuce with Russian dressing, rhubarb shorted, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

The small potatoes in the bottom of the potato tin often are a problem to cook. The cook must cook "forever" if she wants finished potatoes, and they are out the question for baking. This potato dish suggested in the dinner menu uses these small potatoes in an appealing fashion, well worth trying.

Roasted Salt Codfish.
One pound salt codfish, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 lemon, 1 tablespoon minced parsley.

Freshen the fish by soaking several hours in cold water. Three hours will ordinarily treat the fish sufficiently. Drain and dry between paper towels. Oil wires of broiler and broil fish on both sides, broiling first on one side and then on the other. Remove to hot butter and spread with butter. Sprinkle with minced parsley and a dash of paprika and garnish with slices of lemon.

Scrambled Eggs With Chipped Beef.
One-half cup dried beef, 2 tablespoons butter, 5 eggs, 4 tablespoons milk, paprika.

The dried beef should be pulled into small pieces. Melt butter in frying pan and add beef. Cook over a low fire for five minutes. Add milk and beaten eggs. Cook over a low fire, lifting with a fork as the eggs become firm. Season with paprika and serve at once. No salt is necessary as the dried beef is salty.

The Garden

Weeds Meaner Than "Pusley"

A popular vote on the meanness weed probably would show a decision for the grass known in many sections as "devil grass," the annual grass that comes up in great quantities in the garden and if given a chance spreads out and roots at every joint and sends up forked heads of seed. The particular devilishness of this grass which has earned its name is that it always breaks off and leaves the root to grow again when you try to pull it when it is young.

It needs to be hoed. Get the hoed in operation so none of these mean weeds get a start. "Pusley," or more properly purslane used as a synonym for meanness for years, is much abused. It is a comparatively harmless weed easily pulled up and which takes little from the soil as it has a small root system.

Beets and dandelions with their long tap roots are tough customers once they get going. They must be hoed deep or the leaves merely are amputated to grow with renewed vigor. An asparagus knife, a tool with a notched end is excellent to stab these intruders beneath the soil, cutting the tap root and tossing them out of the soil to die.

The chickweed is one of the worst pests, particularly in the flower garden and in shady portions of the premises. It has to be hoed off. It can be found in bloom under leaves almost any winter month in the year when there is a thaw. The ice coating of the past winter, which covered the ground for many days over large

sections of the country, is the one thing so far discovered that killed off chickweed. It was destroyed wholesale by this coating. Watch for the seedlings before they have a chance to branch out and send down their hairlike roots that always break off and never pull up.

White clover is a hard pest to get rid of once it gets a start in the garden as it nails itself down at every joint and has to be pulled up. A few swipes of the hoe during these early days will check all these weeds before they can get started and reduce the labor of gardening by half.
