Film Drama Showing At Star Staged On Mount Rainier.

"Lash of the Whip" At Sherrys Today Only.

The scenic grandeur of Rainier National park in Washington is woven into the background of J. K. McDonald's first National picture, "Frisolous Sal" which is now playing at the Star. McDonald chose for some of the exterior scenes one of the few spots in America where snow may be found the year round.

His company, numbering thirty-eight persons, with three cars of equipment, left Hollywood in the middle of August. They had just missed a heavy fall of snow at Paradise Inn, the nearest habitation to the majestic peak of Rainier. The mountain was blanketed with white far down its slopes and the motion picture company, only three days from the semi-tropical summer of Southern California, found itself within easy walking distance of mid-winter.

Civic authorities at Tacoma, Wash., where the film people left their train, and officials of Rainier National park readily cooperated with the First National producer as his company was said to be the first ever to use Mount Rainier as the background for a dramatic picture. The producer was seeking virgin scenic territory when he chose Mount Rainier.

The company went from Rainier to the great mines at Wallace, Idaho, where several weeks were spent photographing the action of the story among the mills, shafts, tunnels and aerial frams of that famous mining center. The story of "Frisolous Sal" was written by Eugene O'Brien, Mac Duesel, Ben Alexander, Mildred Harris, Mitchell Lewis, Tom Santich, R. H. Null and others.

The "Lash of the Whip," a new type of picture is at Sherry's today.

The star part of "Pinto Pete" is that of a Robin Hood of the Old West, the kind of running, jumping, leaping athletic type that made "Doug" Fairbanks' fame. His only weapons are his resourcefulness and a short-handled, foxtailed "bull-whip," the last of which, welded with marvellous accuracy, is reputed to be deadly. He takes from the rich and gives to the poor, rights the wrongs of the oppressed, and punishes the oppressors.

The story is of the efforts of a railroad company to secure a route across a mountain range against the planning and force of the steamship company. "Pinto Pete" adds the railroad man when all hope seems lost, and after overcoming insurmountable obstacles, the railroad wins. Later "Pinto Pete" is found to be a most important personage who went about incognito for his own good purposes.

The scenes in a remote part of the great Southwest, hitherto unphotographed, are beautiful beyond compare. The picture is a wonderful combination of mystery, pageantry, scenic beauty, romance, danger, dramatic thrills, and physical prowess.
