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RAILROAD SITUATION TO IMPROVE

Carl Gray, U. P. President, Believes that Upward Trend Assured.

PASSES THROUGH LA GRANDE TODAY

Chamber of Commerce Delegation Confers with Official at Station This Morning.

Carl Gray, president of the Union Pacific railroad system, accompanied by A. S. Edmunds, traffic manager, went through La Grande this morning on train No. 24 after a visit in Washington and other inland Empire points.

Mr. Gray is of the opinion that the railroad situation will improve from now on, stating that the bottom has practically been reached.

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MARSHAL AT HUNTINGTON IS ARRESTED

Ed Hannon Charged with Unlawfully Entering Johnson Home

TO AWAIT ACTION OF GRAND JURY

Official Alleged to Have Falsely Accused Huntington Couple; Citizens Seek Ouster.

BAKER, Ore. (Special) — Ed Hannon, city marshal of Huntington, waived examination before Judge G. E. Allen here Tuesday and was bound over to the grand jury, his bail being fixed at \$250, which was immediately raised and Hannon was released.

The complaint filed against him is sworn to by Hans Johnson, of Huntington, who alleged that Hannon kicked in the door of Johnson's home at three o'clock in the morning of April 19th, telling Johnson and his wife that they were under arrest and that they were not married and that he would take them to jail.

MARRIAGE PAPERS SHOWN. According to information, Hannon was partly dressed, Hannon demanded to see the marriage license and when it was produced, he decided not to place them under arrest.

Hannon has been city marshal at Huntington for several years and served until about the first of this year as deputy sheriff of that place.

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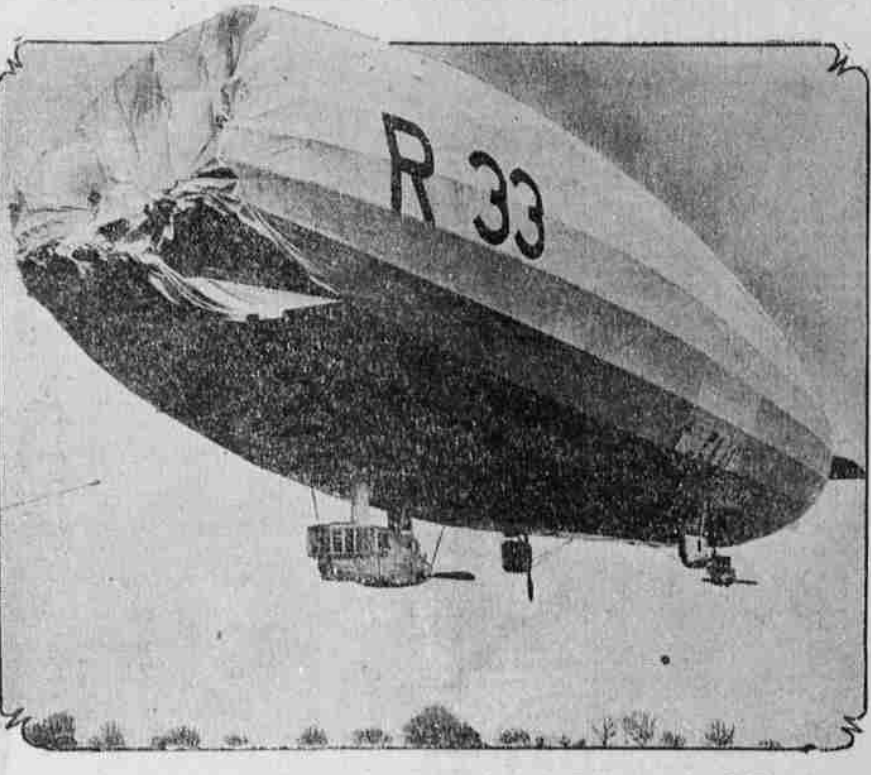
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Blimp Loses Nose in High Wind

COOPERATIVE VOTE PLANNED

WALLOWA, Ore. (Special)—The future policy of the Oregon Co-operative Grain Growers association will be determined by a vote of the membership, according to a general letter which has been ordered mailed out by the executive committee of the organization.

Due to the extreme shortage of wheat during the year of 1924 the board of directors and district delegates voted to suspend operations of the association until such a time as conditions would warrant either a resumption of activities or disorganization of the body.

There is in the hands of the association at this time an amount of approximately \$10,000, serving as a reserve fund, which, if disincorporation is decided upon, will be distributed among the members.

While many of the wheat growers were much in favor of co-operative selling a few years ago, many now feel that they have been compelled to take a smaller price for their wheat handled through the association than they would have received had they been able to market individually.

Bulgarian Soldiers to Be Called to Colors. SOFIA (By the Associated Press)—The Bulgarian government is considering calling one of the army classes to the colors, as it has been unable to get 19,000 additional conscripts recently authorized by the council of a cabinet-aid at Paris to pacify the country.

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TWO YOUNG WOMEN DIE IN FLAMES

Firemen Rescue Many People Trapped in Blazing Structure

MAN PLUNGES TO PAVEMENT BELOW

E. Sullivan, 55, Jumped from Upper Window Before Safety Net Was Fully Spread.

PORTLAND, Ore. (By the Associated Press). Four persons were killed in a fire which early today swept the Hendricks apartments, Fifteenth and Handers streets.

The dead are: Mrs. Clara Short, 20, waitress. Miss Bernice Frazier, about 20, employe of Lipman and Wolf. William H. Lawr, 62, a blind man. E. Sullivan, 55, laborer.

Sullivan died of injuries received when he jumped from the upper story of a window before the life net was fully spread, the firemen said. Mrs. Lawr is suffering from smoke.

Defective Flue. Officials state that the fire started in the basement from a furnace or a defective flue. Credit for saving many lives is given the firemen. The building's occupants were crowded at the windows screaming for help from the firemen arrived.
