10 To Sell Mill Stock. SALEM, Ore.—Forty solicitors from the Salem chamber of commerce will enter the field here in an effort to dispose of \$25,000 of preferred stock in the proposed new linen mill to be erected in or near this city. Stock of \$225,000 already has been sold in Salem.

The proposed linen mill will cost \$450,000 and will employ approximately 250 men. Portland business men have promised to take \$175,000 of the stock, while Albany and Silverton interests will subscribe for \$160,000.

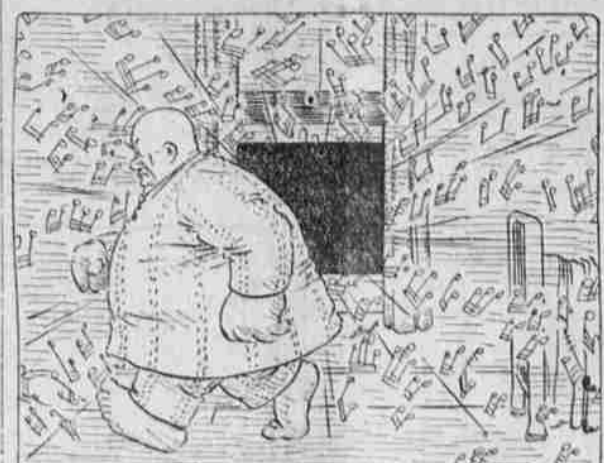

EXPLORER FINDS BOOKS OF UNKNOWN LANGUAGE.

HARBIN (AP)—The site of the ancient city of Harshoto, once capital of the kingdom of Tartar, is reported to have been discovered by P. K. Kosloff, a Russian explorer. He recently has returned from a two years' stay in the heart of Mongolia, bringing with him, it is said, quantities of treasures of interest to scientists.
