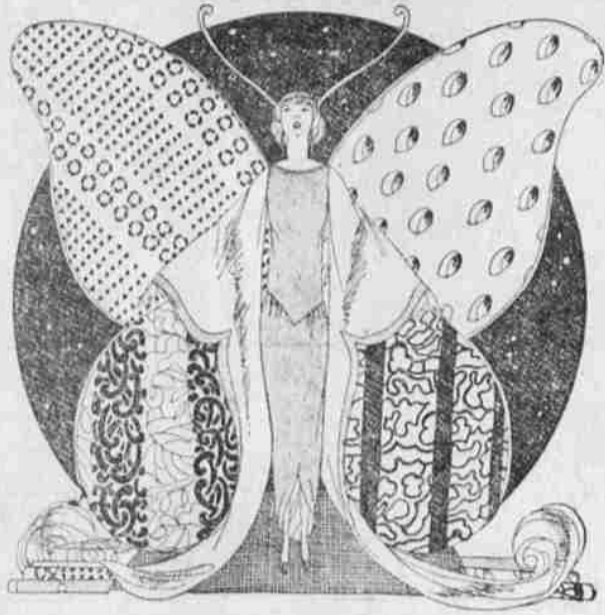

### England Replanting Trees

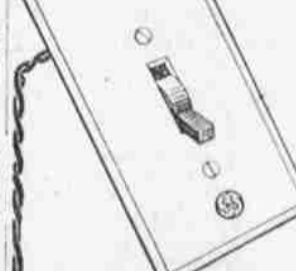

One of the real disappointments of the early baseball season has been the Detroit club. The Tigers have been getting whipped in a most consistent manner. Other western teams have been using the Cobb outfit for a regular opponent.

Before the opening of this chase Detroit was picked as one of the outstanding favorites in the American league. It stacked up as a tough team to beat. It appeared well fortified in practically all departments of play.

But the Tigers, thus far, have found the going extremely rough. At the writing this have taken six straight whippings. And have won only three hits in 13 starts.

In 1924, under Jennings, Detroit lost its first 13 games. It was without a doubt the most disastrous beginning a major league club ever experienced. It put the Tigers on foot for behind that they never did catch up.

This season the club hasn't got off to a much better start, though it had been hoped to get away in good shape.

### BATTING IS WEAK

One reason for the poor showing of the Tigers has been a weakness at the plate. The team hasn't been hitting. At least, not in the manner it is capable of doing. Pleading also has been a bit off edge. Not so many misuses have been made. But errors have cropped out just at critical moments, run ruining.

In the main the team has been getting some good pitching. George Daus and Rip Collins, especially, have displayed a bit of real hurling. In one game Daus had the White Sox blanked for eight frames, only to lose out in the ninth, 1 to 0.

Many games have been dropped by close scores, which show the team hasn't been so badly out-classed. Other frays have been lost when they looked in the box. This was especially true of Monday's drub with the Browns, where the Tigers went into the ninth leading 3 to 2, only to have Stalor's team chase over seven counters and grab the game.

With Ty Cobb back in the game, the Tigers should do better, however. And it would not be surprising to see them strike a real winning unit shortly. They have the stuff to do it with.
