The amount of classics taught in these schools was reduced after the conclusion of the war, but now the pre-war amount of Greek and Latin has been re-established.

## Sister Mary's Kitchen

**Breakfast**  
Orange juice, cereal with raisins, thin, cream, crisp rye toast, broiled ham, creamed potatoes, milk, coffee.

**Luncheon**  
Dried beef with rice, lettuce sandwiches, drop molasses cookies, milk, tea.

**Dinner**  
Stuffed mutton chops, mashed potatoes, creamed turnips, water cream and orange salad, rutabaga pie, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

The breakfast ham and creamed potatoes are suggested particularly for children who must go to school, cereal, toast and milk.

A dish of stewed rhubarb should be substituted for the pie in the dinner menu for children under 18 years of age.

**Dried Beef With Rice**  
Cook one pound dried beef, 1 cup milk, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 1 teaspoon minced onion, 1/2 cup rice, 2 tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons grated cheese.

Cook rice in boiling salted water until tender. Melt butter in frying pan, add dried beef, picked in small pieces, and onion, and cook five minutes. Add milk and stir in rice and cheese. Season with pepper and turn into a well buttered baking dish. Bake in a moderate oven until milk is absorbed and the mixture is firm to the touch.

**Stuffed Mutton Chops**  
Six rib chops, 1/2 pound sausage meat, 1/2 cup dried bread crumbs, 1 egg, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper.

The chops should be cut thick. Cut off fat and make a deep incision down the edge of each chop to the bone. Combine sausage and bread crumbs with egg. Mix well and season with salt and pepper. Fill the chops with mixture and sew or pin the edges together with small skewers. Sprinkle with salt and pepper and roll in flour. Place in roaster and roast for 45 minutes in a moderate oven. If cooked in an open roaster baste every five minutes with two tablespoons butter melted in one cup boiling water. "Small skewers" are smooth wooden toothpicks.
