Miss Nilsson will enact Countess Corleau, a Danish woman who wins unusual success in business and romance in the Alaskan gold rush days by her courage.

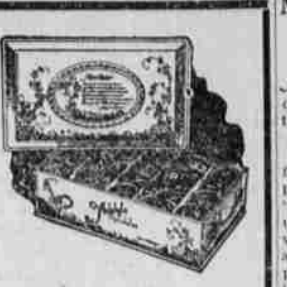
