Tourist Travel Heads For American Shores

GOTHENBURG (AP)—More Swedish tourists for the United States and a increasing number of emigrants for Canada is the effect of the American immigration law on Swedish westward travel, as it pours through this gateway to the Atlantic.

While the normal Swedish over-flow population is about 20,000 a year, the number admitted as immigrants in the United States is limited for 1925 to 2551. In Canada the young farmers of the north continue to be welcome and the Canadian governmental authorities have promised cooperation in their distribution.

At the same time there are many Swedes who wish to visit the United States as tourists, and to meet this demand Swedish travel interests now plan to organize a regular conducted tours through the eastern and middle western states, with all expenses covered in one lump sum.

At there is no restriction on the number of round trip tourists, this class is expected to fill up the space usually reserved for emigrants.

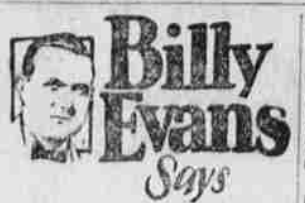
GRIP BEATS BRITTON

Billy Evans Says

LIVELY BALL.
Batting averages in the spring form a basis for the annual rumor that the major league ball is much livelier.

The other day I noticed where the manufacturer of the balls used in both major leagues, denied the report.

A flock of home runs during the first few weeks of play, no doubt was largely responsible for the belief that more dynamite had been placed in the ball.

It is a matter of precedent that the batters round into form more quickly in the spring than the pitchers. This is the main reason for the delay the batters usually hold in April and May.

Small parks rather than a lively ball are the biggest factors in making for home runs. In a desire to get seating capacity, the playing territory in many parks is cramped. My belief is that should they ever go for home runs.

About June first when the warm weather sets in and the pitchers strike their stride, we may look forward to a curtailment of the batting averages.

ALL-AMERICA.
Walter Camp, the originator of the All-America idea in football, is dead. What will become of his creation?

In football to be selected on the Walter Camp eleven was the same to the college athlete as playing in a world series, in to the professional.

No one man or body of men could possibly select 11 players out of the hundreds of candidates that

would meet with universal approval. For years Camp's selections have brought forth much criticism from coaches and football experts. Being human, he made mistakes and often omitted certain players from his team who had the unanimous approval of most of the experts.

Despite this, every college football player had the making of Camp's All-America as his goal. Other experts picked teams just as good, but making them failed to carry with it the prestige that went with a Walter Camp selection. Certain leading coaches have at various times expressed the opinion that the All-America idea was harmful because it failed to prove a thing and made much ill-feeling.

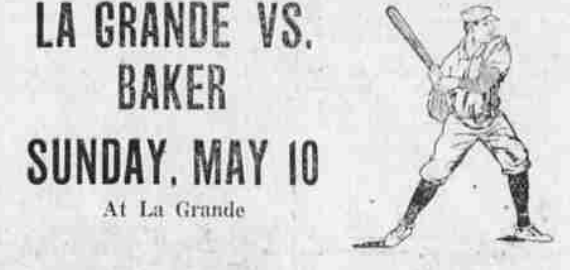
However, the All-America eleven is almost a part of football, and it seems as if some sort of settling out the idea and perpetuating it, should be aimed at by the powers in football.

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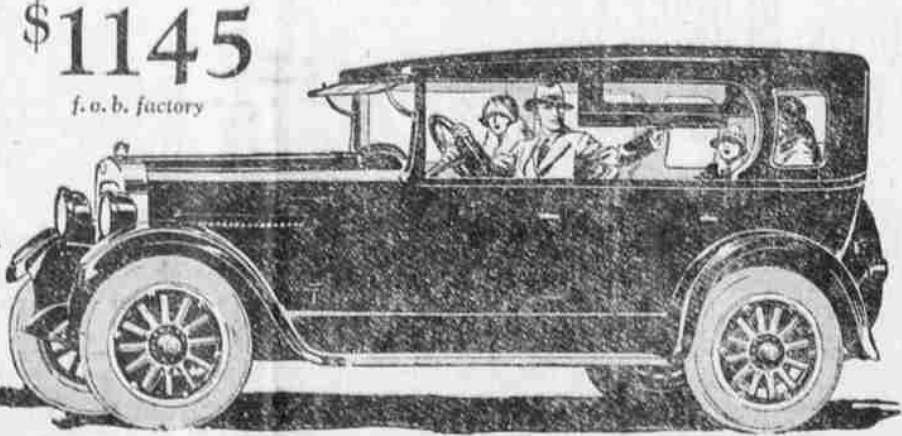
