Mexico Raises Postage To Fight Plague

MEXICO CITY (AP)—New sources of revenue are constantly being uncovered by the Mexican administration in prosecuting its campaign for the fiscal rehabilitation of the government.

A 10 per cent increase in domestic postage rates has been decreed by the president to raise funds for the checking of a plague of locusts which is sweeping north and west from the Tehuantepec isthmus. The proceeds from a special cent surtax on such items in postage will be employed in fighting locusts.

With new sources of income to meet extraordinary demands on the federal treasury, increasing returns from the income and corporation taxes, the budget balanced theoretically in 1924, and the railway and telegraph deficits wiped out by the abolition of passes and franks, government officials are confident that the president's efforts to secure a surplus of \$72,500,000 before Sept. 1, to establish a single bank of issue will be successful.

Official quarters are silent, however, on the administration's attitude toward the resumption of service on foreign debt, under the Lamont-de la Huerta agreement, suspended for more than a year. It is known that negotiations are being carried on with representatives of the international bankers' committee for a revision of the agreement in favor of Mexico.

High Tariffs Will Soon Agitate Germany

DUSSELDORF, Germany, (AP)—While politicians are flouting an election combination at Berlin, and getting much newspaper attention a gigantic economic struggle is going on behind the scenes in Germany of which the general public is at present ignorant.

The issue is the tariff. The tariff shall Germany have high protective tariffs, or shall it enter into a customs union with as many nations as possible?

Ordinarily one hears a great deal in Germany about the struggle between the so-called heavy industry of the Ruhr Valley and the manufacturing industries of Saxony, Thuringia, and southern Germany. In the struggle over protection vs. virtual free trade, however, the issue is a different one.

Heavy industrial concerns are "fought" fighting shoulder to shoulder with one group of manufacturing industries.

Those who favor a high protective tariff argue that so long as Germany is fettered with reparations payments, its production costs will continue to be so high that there is danger of dumping by foreign countries. Therefore, the only way to help German industry is to protect the home industries by high tariffs.

The other argument in favor of customs unions runs as follows: Germany has become so crippled by the loss of Alsace-Lorraine and her colonies, the shelling off of Upper Silesia, and the placing under foreign administration of the Saar basin, that the only way to bring about a new Germany is by franchising out into foreign countries. But as other nations would be unwilling to receive German goods unless similar favorable treatment be accorded their goods in Germany, the customs union advocates argue that Germany should abolish tariff barriers as far as possible. This may mean the ruination of some of Germany's industries, they admit, but on the whole Germany will be benefited.

This issue will come to the fore more than ever after the triumph of the presidential election has subsided.

Screen Stars Soothed By Music During Work

HOLLYWOOD, Cal. (AP)—Music in all its variations, from the soothing tones of the classic compositions to the whine and crash of the jazz band, has become an essential accompaniment to the steady clicking of the moving picture cameras in the studios and on the production lots here.

Temporary actresses, whose heads have been used by a stymie maid or an ill-fitting gown during the make-up period in the morning, left many directors in desperation until the innovation of "sideline" music.

In 1916, when this adjunct to filmmaking was introduced, the instrument was a rickety portable organ, but it served to soothe the emotions of the actress. Its deep sonatas, the directors said, deepened the actresses' memories of the mild and unpleasant gown.

Pianos were tried, but found impossible to move to the various sets about the studio, and had to be banded together when the company journeyed to location, perhaps hundreds of miles away.

The directors have unanimously adopted the musical "gag" as an important threat in wearing the unpleasantness of the silver screen.

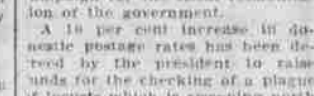
Stimund Freed, renowned psycho-analyst, in a recently published autobiography, says he is the rightful discoverer of the use of cocaine as local anesthetic.

 He favored a six hour working day for his employees, but never worked less than 16 hours a day himself. He was often described as a human dynamo—intense, high powered, swift-moving and direct. He had a thorough grasp of principles, and with it a complete mastery of detail. He was an organizer with all the subtleties that he was gentle and kindly.

His system of co-partnership was started in 1901 and never has been changed.

"Work six hours a day at your maximum power of production," he would say to his employees. "Study and improve yourselves two hours a day, and I can afford to pay you for eight hours of work."

Lord Leverhulme was born in 1851, at Bolton, Lancashire, and in 1874 married Elizabeth Hulme, who died in 1913. They had one son, W. H. Lever, who is the only heir to his father's vast fortune.

Lord Leverhulme was elevated to the peerage in 1917, taking his own name combined with the maiden name of his wife.

Purposes Announced.
 Of particular interest to local people was Lieutenant Kelley's prediction that the government air mail will soon be extended to cover the Oregon territory.

The plane in which Lieutenant Kelley flew to La Grande on this occasion made the entire trip from Portland in two hours and 17 minutes.

This plane, a DeHavilland with a Liberty motor had several very recent improvements which Mr. Kelley pointed out. Among other things the gasoline tank was placed ahead of the pilot instead of at his rear. In the older type planes when the ship took a nosedive the pilot was usually killed by the momentum of the gas tank at his rear. This tank weighing in the neighborhood of 800 pounds would be torn loose from its hinges by the force of the impact and crush the pilot. The possibility of this occurrence has been eliminated by placing the tank at the head of the ship and directly behind the motor.

Another feature of the plane is the fact that it is a biplane. This means that it has two sets of wings. The upper wing is fixed and the lower wing is movable. This allows the pilot to adjust the angle of the wings to suit the conditions of the air.
