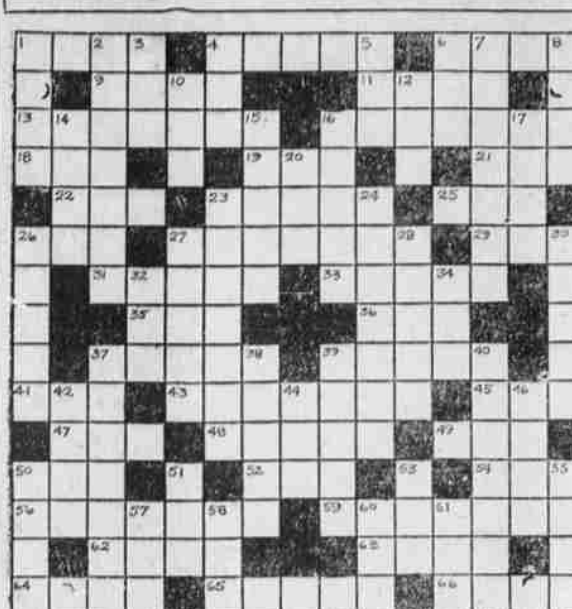

Tuesday evening at the Imbier amusement hall a moving picture show was given. These pictures were from the Henry Ford laboratories and were both entertaining and educational.

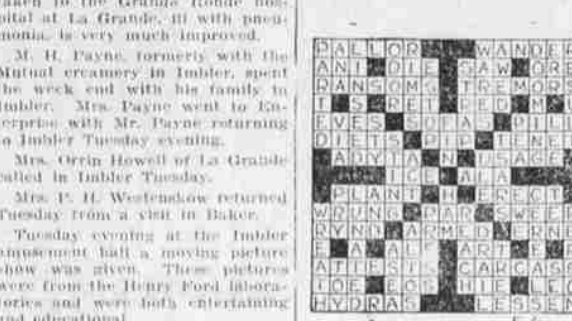
Observer Crossword Puzzle

FOSDICK CASE TO BE ARGUED

COLUMBUS, O. (AP)—The case of Dr. Harry Emerson Fosdick, Baptist minister, who recently vacated the pulpit of the First Presbyterian church of New York City at the request of the Presbyterian general assembly, again will be the center of controversy when the assembly convenes here the week beginning May 21.

The Fosdick dispute arose at last year's session over the question of his orthodoxy. His opponents succeeded in getting the assembly to vote for the termination of his relationship with the Presbyterian church. Immediate action, however, was not taken by the New York presbytery and it was this delay that is expected to bring comment by a faction of the assembly headed by Dr. Walter J. Buchanan, pastor of Broadway Presbyterian church, New York.

Dr. Buchanan and his associates also will bring other cases against the New York presbytery. It is announced here, charging that it has licensed young ministers to preach who do not believe in the Virgin Birth, the miracles of Christ, and other fundamentals of the New Testament. These cases will be tried in executive session by the judicial committee, a separate body which sits apart from the general assembly. If the assembly does not accept the findings of the commission, then the case at issue will be tried before the assembly.

The first test of the strength of the fundamentalists and the liberals will come on the election of a moderator at the opening session. The fundamentalists won last year, electing as moderator Dr. Clarence Edward Macartney, pastor of Arch Street Presbyterian church, Philadelphia. Dr. Macartney was credited with being mainly responsible for the bringing to a head of the charges against the New York presbytery centering around Dr. Fosdick.

The fundamentalists this year are expected to support Dr. Laplace A. McAfee of Berkeley, Cal. William Jennings Bryan, representing the Florida presbytery, could have the nomination for moderator on behalf of the fundamentalists, but refuse to stand for the office representing a divided church, according to the view here. Another likely candidate for moderator is Dr. William O. Thompson of Columbus, president of Ohio State university. He has been for 25 years in this office.

The Presbyterian general assembly will be officially attended by 7,000 newly elected commissioners from the 229 presbyteries throughout the United States and by board secretaries and other officials totaling nearly 2,000. Annual reports will be submitted by all the boards and agencies to a special committee headed by Dr. Joseph A. Vance of Detroit. Mich. will present a report for a plan systematizing the finances of the denomination into one unified method in the interests of economy and efficiency.

San Francisco and Los Angeles radio programs by persons residing in Tacoma and within a 20-mile radius was impossible when the precipitators were running.
