Sister Mary's Kitchen BY SISTER MARY

Breakfast: Stewed rhubarb, broiled bacon, soft cooked eggs, bran muffins with raisins, milk, coffee.

Luncheon: Creamed new onions on toast, cereal pudding, milk, tea.

Dinner: Broiled salmon steak, horseradish cream, new potatoes in parsley sauce, Harvard beans, old-fashioned strawberry shortcake, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

Since a cereal was not served for breakfast, a cereal pudding is suggested for the luncheon dessert.

Fish without sauce, beets, bread, milk, and strawberries without the shortcake, furnish an abundant dinner for children under school age.

Harvard Beets

Five or six medium sized beets, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 tablespoon cornstarch, 4 tablespoons lemon juice, 8 tablespoons orange juice, 2 tablespoons butter, few grains pepper. Boil beets until tender and slip off skins under cold water. Cut into half-inch cubes. Mix sugar and cornstarch. Stir in fruit juices and when thoroughly blended cook, stirring constantly for five minutes. Add diced beets and let stand over hot water for 20 min-

Women's Clubs Come Out Against Woman Governor

BALTIMORE (AP)—A proposal to nominate a woman for governor of Maryland is meeting with strong opposition from women. An effort at a recent convention of the United Democratic Women's Clubs of the state at Salisbury to

obtain the endorsement of Mrs. W. W. Hubbard, of Chestertown, for the gubernatorial honor, failed and subsequently the Baltimore Federation of Democratic Women put its official stamp of disapproval on the nomination of women candidates for the office.

The federation received "that there be recorded as the unanimous sense of the Federation of Democratic Women, Incorporated, of Baltimore, in view of the recent public reports with respect to the nomination of a woman for governor of Maryland, the federation's emphatic opposition to the ill-timed and hasty thought giving rise to this ambitious proposal."

There will be no election for governor in Maryland until November, 1926.

PIERCE HIRES CLEAVER

SALEM, Ore.—Although George L. Cleaver was removed as state prohibition director following legislative investigation, the records here show that he has since been employed as a special prohibition agent by Governor Pierce. On April 2 of this year the records show that Mr. Cleaver received a check for \$147.71 for services performed as special agent under the statute authorizing the governor a fund for that purpose.
