WE HOPE THEY COME AGAIN.

WHERE THE MONEY GOES.

Of every \$100 of public revenue paid into the United States treasury the legislative department spends 40 cents, the executive department spends 10 cents, the independent federal offices spend \$13.40, the agricultural department spends \$4.20, the department of commerce spend 70 cents, the department of interior spends \$9, the department of justice spends 60 cents, the department of labor spends 20 cents, the navy department spends \$9.50, the war department spends \$10.10, the treasury department spends \$8.10, the District of Columbia spends 70 cents, subscriptions to capital stock of Federal Intermediate Credit banks take 30 cents, the interest on the public debt consumes \$28.20, the premium on the public debt consumes 10 cents more and the retirement of the public debt eats up the remaining \$13.50 of the \$100.

There is little significance in these individual items of the national budget unless they are placed in comparison. A comparison of the component items is far from encouraging for it discloses that 60 per cent of the national revenue is spent for military preparation and in paying off the war debt. War is an expensive game even in peace time.

It is lamentable that the nation must spend \$9.20 to maintain a navy for every \$4.20 spent for the protection and extension of the national food supply and that \$10.10 is spent on a peace time army for every 10 cents spent for the administration of the affairs of the nation. There are good and valid reasons why the American people look forward to the abolishment of military forces throughout the world, even though it be the millennium.

Will Honor American Dead In Westminster Abbey

LONDON (AP)—The recently organized London branch of the American Overseas Memorial association, composed of all the American organizations in the British metropolis, will have charge this year of the memorial services to be held in Westminster Abbey and at the cemeteries of England and Ireland where lie buried some 700 Americans. After the Abbey ceremonies on the morning of May 20 members of the association will journey to Brookwood cemetery, 25 miles from London, where rest 454 Americans who died in the late war. Here special exercises will be held.

Brookwood is a British national cemetery, with a section devoted to soldiers from the United States who died here from wounds sustained in France. In Ireland there are buried 91 American soldiers and sailors who died during the world war. In various other sections of the country there are a score or so of graves of Americans who fought in the wars of 1812 and 1861. These also will be decorated with wreaths on May 20.

Slayer of Grand Duke Michael Loses Life in Airplane Accident

RIGA (AP)—Miasnikoff, the Bolshevik commissary who in 1918 was commissioned to do away with Grand Duke Michael, recently was killed in an airplane accident. It is reported from Leningrad.

Carrying out the assignment of royal assassination, Miasnikoff went to Bern and managed to be admitted to the grand duke on the pretext that he was sent by a secret society of aristocrats to conduct the grand duke to Siberia and thence to safety in England.

The grand duke's English secretary, Harry Johnston, becoming suspicious, warned his employer, but Miasnikoff succeeded in abducting both in two automobiles and as they were passing a forest he and his agents are said to have murdered the grand duke and his secretary.

Jockey Hurries, Mount Loses

LONDON (AP)—Due to ride in the first race at the Derby meeting Steve Donoghue, the noted jockey, missed his train at St Pancras. He telephoned the Croxson airframe and ordered an airplane in which he flew to Derby, but the horse he hurried over to ride could only get third place.
