Human Kindness Bank Compelled to Suspend

SEATTLE (AP)—Moved by the desire to help needy and worthy prisoners, William Pigott, a philanthropic local manufacturer, put up \$500 a few months ago to aid the down and out. The money was to be loaned only on the security of human nature, a promise to pay within 30 days, and its disbursement was entirely in the hands of Justice of the Peace C. C. Dalton.

Prisoners brought before the judge were advanced sums ranging from \$2 to \$20. The \$500 was in the course drawn on heavily, but only one loan, for \$2, has been repaid. Two other debtors came back and asked for more time, but all the others vanished quickly. The judge and the philanthropist, somewhat more cynical, have suspended disbursements at least temporarily.

The advances were confined to prisoners released by the court or discharged after serving terms in the county jail. "I wouldn't have believed it," said Judge Dalton recently. "It looked like a fine idea, helping the lows, retrieving lost souls and all that sort of thing. But, hang it all, the souls won't be saved, and so we've got to save what's left of the bank."

ANCIENT RIVER STUDIED

BEND, Ore.—The geology of the county in the vicinity of the junctions of Crooked and Deschutes rivers and Deschutes and Metolius rivers was examined over the weekend by Dr. Edwin T. Hoag, University of Oregon geologist, who has been in the Bend country for several days.

Of special interest to the visiting geologist was the evidence in the Cascade area of the great river which in ancient times cut a deep channel into sedimentary formations. During the period of excavation this channel was filled with lava from 500 to 800 feet in depth. The contact line of the lava with the old river bed is plainly visible near the cove.

German Compliment Women

The reason for this is partly the fact that in Europe there is still some prejudice against young women venturing out unaccompanied. By calling a young woman of marriageable age "Fran," the German gentleman feels that he is paying her the compliment of assuming that she is married and hence free from molestation.

Partly, too, the women themselves have favored the designation "Fran," as they feel that the signifier is somewhat of an object of ridicule. They argue that as soon as a boy grows up he gets the designation "fyer," whether he is married or not, then why should a difference be made between married and unmarried women?

ENGLAND LETS CONTRACTS TO IMPROVE AIR DEFENSE

LONDON (AP)—Contracts have been placed by the air ministry for ten new aerodromes in various parts of the country. These are part of the amplified scheme of air defense and will be equipped for the use of squadrons of day and night fighters for the defense of the capital will be sent up.

Further on will be another chain of air defenders with special coastal stations from which machines will ascend to attack raiders before they reach the coast. From another series of aerodromes situated at strategic points will operate big weight-carrying bombers to raid air bases of the enemy.

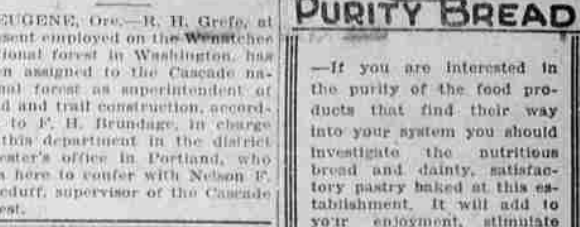
