Sister Mary's Kitchen

BY SISTER MARY

Breakfast—Baked rhubarb, cereal, thin cream, crisp graham toast, rice pancakes, sirup, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Cream of tomato soup, croquettes, vegetable timbales, omelette and nut bread sandwiches, milk, tea.

Dinner—Cream of spinach soup, toasted crackers, chicken salad, cheese cups, raised strawberry shortcake, milk, coffee.

A broiled lamb chop or an egg should be provided for a child under 10 years of age in place of the chicken salad. If the shortcake is served cold, children under school age may indulge, but warm from the oven plain bread and butter with crushed berries should be substituted.

Raised Strawberry Shortcake
One-half yeast cake, 1-2 cup sugar, 1 egg, 1 cup milk, 1-2 tea-spoon salt, 4 tablespoons melted butter, flour, 1 quart strawberries, 1 cup sugar.

Sift 2 cups flour with sugar and salt. Beat egg well and add to milk. Slowly add second mixture to first, stirring constantly. Beat in melted butter. Add yeast cake dissolved in 4 tablespoons water cooled to lukewarm temperature. Cool water before adding yeast cake. Cover batter and let rise until double its bulk. Add enough more flour to make a soft dough. The dough should be just stiff enough to roll. Roll about three-fourths inch thick and put into a slightly floured pie pan. Let rise to double its bulk. Put into a very hot oven for ten minutes. Reduce temperature and bake twenty minutes longer. Remove from oven, split, butter and spread with berries crushed and sweetened with sugar. Put on remaining half of cake, cover with remaining berries and serve with sugar and cream.

Claims New Facts On Hebrew Bible

LEIPSI, (AP)—A revolution in Bible research work is forecast by the investigations, published in book form, of Prof. Franz Wutz of the Reichstadt-Biblical Lyceum, entitled "New Facts on the Septuaginta and Hebrew Bible."

The current version that the Greek-Alexandrian translation of the Old Testament, known as the Septuaginta, is derived from the original Hebrew text seems to be shattered by the theory of Prof. Wutz. The author is taken very seriously by biblical scholars, even those whose favorite theory he confutes by his statements, as, for instance, the well known exponent of the Old Testament, Rudolf Kittel.

Prof. Wutz now comes out with the new and somewhat startling statement that the Septuaginta is largely a reproduction of Hebrew words written with Greek letters. He claims to have discovered that as early as 200 B. C. Jewish scholars utilized Greek-Hebrew texts for their translations into Greek. These translations, he believes, furnished not only an etymology of the Septuaginta—but also open up an entirely new vista in old biblical literature. An authority like Kittel recognizes in these discoveries of Wutz a likely means of arriving at the much sought for original Hebrew text of the Old Testament.
