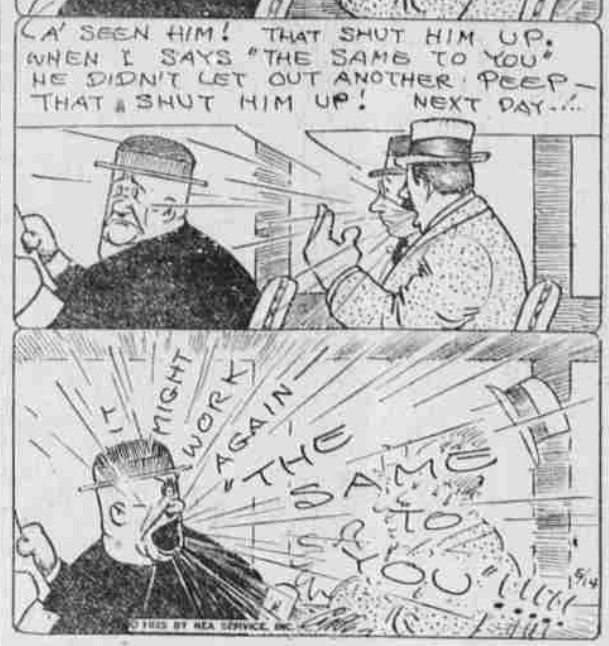

Corinne Griffith Appears in "Beauty in Distress"

New Paramount Comedy Is Thriller.

A magazine writer, in a recent review of the film, career of Corinne Griffith, referred to her as "beauty in distress." Her picture, he added, almost always showed her in difficulty because of her pulchritude.

In "Love's Wilderness," her latest First National production, Corinne faces quite a different situation. She is still "beauty in distress," however, it is not because of her wealth. It is her coquetry which leads her into difficulty.

The story, written by Evelyn Campbell, a well known writer, shows Corinne as the belle of a little Louisiana town and engaged to wed an explorer. Her first of calling for him to return, though, and finally slopes with a comparative stranger.

The story, which Jack Cunningham skillfully adapted from the absorbing novel of the same name by "Chatterbox" Rudington Kelland, combines rip-roaring action, wholesome humor and a rousing romance.

What could be more provocative of thrills and excitement than a beautiful young miss, editor of a small-town newspaper, starting in to solve the mysterious disappearance of a sheriff and finding herself fighting a gang of run-raniers and bootleggers?

And what is funnier than a male beauty contest with its inevitable rivalry, or the romance of a dignified young professor who tries to express his love in words of six syllables?

Add to that a villainous deputy-sheriff and a crooked politician who holds a mortgage on the newspaper, and you begin to realize that the picture possesses all the necessary ingredients for an hour or so of worthwhile entertainment.

To make certain that justice would be done to the various characters in the story, Director Crossland has assembled a hand-picked cast of experienced and popular players. Lois Wilson, as the amateur editor-detective, has a role that offers her splendid opportunities of displaying her delightful personality and histrionic ability; Noah Berry is an effective villain; Raymond Hatton portrays a serious comic part in his usual finished

DOG SAVES MAN'S LIFE

MAINEFIELD, Ore. — Ed Oldland, rancher living five miles west of Marshfield, owes his life to the loyalty of his mongrel dog, which grabbed a wounded black bear which charged Mr. Oldland and was within a few feet of him when the dog slipped brain's hind leg. Oldland had no arms or means of defense and would have been killed by the animal but for the dog and another one which entered the fray.
