Daily Morning Observer, May 16, 1898—Prof. Roy Conklin, of Union, is in the city today. The Wallowa Herald is thinking strongly of issuing a daily. The rain last night was welcomed all over the valley. It was badly needed. Manuvel Snyder will take charge of the public school in district No. 24, commonly called Clay district, this Monday morning for a four months term. James Turner will leave today for the Slim Jim mine, on Grande Ronde river. This promising mine is owned by W. D. Palmer and James Turner. Yesterday about 2 o'clock D. M. McDonalds bunk house was found to be on fire. Some bedding and a stove were destroyed. Fishermen who went to Ladd creek yesterday to have a little sport out of the ordinary were surprised to a real surprise. A regular hail storm descended upon them.

The Blue Mountain band gave its open air concert last Saturday evening in their newly constructed band stand. The boys were compelled, on account of the wind to stop playing before they had much more than began the program they had prepared.

Fugue Formation Observed In Wock's Earliest Music. BERLIN (AP)—The oldest musical manuscript known has been deciphered by Dr. Curt Sachs, music historian at the Berlin university.

It is of Babylonian origin with cuneiform ideographs inscribed on clay plates, and was found at Assur in Asia Minor. This music is said to date back to the second century B. C. Half tones are not employed at all, but five tones of the scale are used in fugue formation. The accompaniment to the melody is furnished by a harp of 15 strings, for which double steps are frequently prescribed.

Timber Changes Hands. ALBANY, Ore.—For a consideration of about \$150,000 the Mealy brothers, timber and sawmill owners near Poston, in western Lin county, have sold their timber holdings of 2194.56 acres to Louis W. Hill, head of the Northern Pacific railway system. The deed was recorded here and transferred the land from O. J. and William Mealy, to Louis W. Hill.

This is one of the largest timber deals ever carried through in this section and is of considerable importance because of the location of the timber on the Quartzville fork of the Santiam river, about 20 miles from Poston. This acquisition by the Hill interests increases the holdings of that company in eastern Lin county as that Hill now ranks close in Weyerhaeuser interests. The Weyerhaeuser and Hill interests now virtually have a monopoly on timber in Lin county outside of the federal reserves.

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Dr. Ingle Receives Invitation to Reunion

An invitation to attend a reunion of his osteopathic colleagues, to be held in Canada, had been received by Dr. J. L. Ingle.

It is safe to say that this class has never held a reunion outside of the states, but this year the osteopathic profession will hold its annual international convention in Toronto, in early July.

Many osteopathic college classes are planning reunions. Osteopathy is starting on the second half-century of its history. It is celebrating not only by going outside of the United States, for its convention, but also by chartering a ship and going to visit some of the leading hospitals and clinics in Great Britain, and the Radium and Pasteur institutes in Paris.

A number of leading physicians in the profession are arranging to give post graduate instruction on shipboard, both on the way over and on the return trip.

CIDER HELD DANGEROUS. VICTORIA, B. C. (AP)—Decision of Commissioner Davidson of the liquor control board, that cider is too dangerous to be sold in beer shops in British Columbia, was announced Thursday. The commissioner explained that "cider is hard to handle, it increases rapidly in alcoholic content; it is liable to go off."
