## Sister Mary's Kitchen

Breakfast—Strawberries, cereal, thin cream, crisp rye toast, soft-cooked eggs, milk, coffee.

Lunch—Cream of onion soup, croquettes, brown bread, rhubarb marmalade, caramel custard, milk, tea.

Dinner—Dressed beef cutlets, dried creamed potatoes, buttered asparagus, radishes and spring onions, strawberry shortcake, milk, coffee.

Many people like an uncooked cereal during the warmer months. Green-ups will like their berries and cereal served as one but junkies should be served berries with a little sugar and no cream, so the combination dish is impossible.

Cream of Onion Soup  
One cup of sliced onion, 1 cup dried celery, 2 tablespoons minced parsley, 4 tablespoons butter, 1 tablespoon flour, 2 cups milk, 1 egg, salt and pepper.

Cook onion, celery and parsley in butter over a low fire until vegetables are soft. Stir in flour. When well blended slowly add milk stirring constantly. Bring to the boiling point while stirring, reduce heat and simmer for thirty minutes. Beat egg slightly with 2 tablespoons cream. Strain soup into egg, stirring vigorously. Cook 2 minutes, stirring constantly and serve.

Rhubarb Marmalade  
Eight cups dried rhubarb, 2 oranges, 1 cup raisins, 7 cups sugar, 1 teaspoon salt.

Wash rhubarb and do not peel. Cut oranges in thin slices, discarding seeds and thick skin. Add to rhubarb and cook in 11 cups water until thick. Pour into sterilized jelly glasses and cover with paraffin when cold.

## Peeress Welcomes Cut In Cost of Court Dress

LONDON (AP).—Ready-made gowns will appear at court functions this season for the first time. The innovation, the idea of which was imported from the United States by court dressmakers to suit the purse of some of their customers among princesses and peeresses, also includes the purchase of dresses on the installment plan.

According to the dressmakers, many youthful daughters of earls and dukes were the first to welcome this economical solution of their reduced clothing allowances, and a rushing business has resulted among those modesties who have taken up the plan. For £20 the young women have been able

to find exclusive models designed and executed by artists of color and the seamstress whereas a few years ago they would have paid two or three times as much.

Some of the court dressmakers, this season, have abolished the old time custom of sales by appointment only and because of the keen competition in their line of business, are willing to serve customers any time they appear.

London Children Welcome Squirrels from America  
LONDON (AP).—Grey squirrels imported from the United States some years ago, have made themselves perfectly at home in this climate, and, like the English sparrows sent to the United States from the British Isles several generations back, have begun to scut-

ter about the country. The first squirrels of this variety were given their freedom in Regent's Park, London, and already they have been found in forests as far as 25 miles north of the British capital. The squirrels have made friends in the parks here among the visitors, and take food from the hands of children. The noisy little fellows have become very popular indeed, but it has been so long since they had a peanut, peanuts not

being so common here as in America, that they have nearly forgotten what one tastes like. Chicago University students have a mistake-growing contest. It should stop nesting parties.
