England Studies Routes For Aviation Over India

LONDON (AP)—Sir Hector Sutherland, director of civil aviation, returned to London recently after having completed in four months a 17,000 mile journey by air to India and back in the same airplane in which he started. The machine made the entire flight without a single mechanical breakdown.

The purpose of the trip was to investigate the possibility of commercial aviation under tropical conditions. Sir Hector declared upon his return that there should be no difficulty in crossing India by air.
