## Lloyds To Carry Old Time Traditions Into New Home

LONDON (AP)—Homage to the memory of "Eddie" Lloyd, who kept a little hole-in-the-wall coffee shop in Tower street 237 years ago where British merchants began to meet for the transaction of shipping business, is to be paid by King George himself and numerous others of note on May 23. Then the king will lay the foundation stone for Lloyd's new building which is to cost \$6,000,000 and will require several years to build.

The Lloyds of these days—that is, the coffee shop—occupied but one small room. Richer and all, and the rent was but a few shillings a week. In Lombard street where the new structure is to stand, entire blocks of old offices were demolished to make room for a new headquarters for the Lloyd's of today. The new building is to be one of the largest ever constructed in England.

In 1822 the business of the shipping merchants took a more definite course, and it was decided to desert Eddie's place for larger quarters. A move was made to Lombard street and the romance of Lloyd's began to take a form which in time, was to make the name of the old coffee shop known to shipping men in every quarter of the globe. The business grew rapidly and again in 1774 new offices were set up in the Royal exchange in Cornhill, where they have been ever since.

Although the business originally was confined to the insurance of shipping risks, Lloyd's today deals in nearly every kind of risk. ## Railway Freight Shows Considerable Increase

The Railway Age calls attention to the fact that the total car loadings of 981,711 reported for the week ended May 2 were larger than those reported for any week of last year until that ended on August 23, when last year's peak revival of traffic had begun.

"The prediction made in an editorial in this paper recently that there would not be, in the spring and summer of this year, a decline of railroad freight business such as occurred last year," says the Railway Age, "has thus far been quite completely vindicated. In every week since that ended March 28 for which reports are now available coal shipments have increased and total freight business has been larger than in the corresponding week of last year.

"In the week ended May 2 coal shipments were 142,218 carloads. This was 22,000 carloads more than in the corresponding week of 1924 and also more than in any week of 1924 from that ended March 28 to that ended August 23. 
## JUDGEE PLANS ARE LAID

## Artificial Wells to Keep Up Minnehaha

MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—Picturesque Minnehaha falls, immortalized by Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, and known throughout the country as a park showplace associated with much Indian lore, will be saved from virtual drouth and preserved by artificial means, under a plan approved by the local board of park commissioners.

Due to an abnormal deficiency in precipitation in recent years Minnehaha creek, which supplies the waterfall, has suffered such a decreased flow, as to make it impossible to sustain the falls. It was explained by Theodore Wirth, superintendent of the local park board.

As a remedy, the park board has begun a project of supplying the water through the drilling of wells. An 800-foot well is being sunk in Minnehaha creek. Superintendent Wirth said, and it is hoped to strike a flowing well, but failing in this, a pump will be installed. Should one well be insufficient, several others will be sunk.

Minnehaha Falls has a beautiful 65-foot drop, and is about 45 feet wide. Tourists from many states visit the waterfall and adjacent park, legends of which are enshrined in many of the romantic works of the Indians who once inhabited it.

Work on the project is expected to be completed by middle summer, Mr. Wirth said.
