 that anything of this kind practiced on an American would start a terrible howl, not only from the victim, but here at home, as well. "The demand that 'something be done.' And it might be very hard to think up anything effective to do.

The State Department recalls that President Roosevelt had such a case to deal with once—minus the detail of the mutilated ear. It was of the naturalized American—he was born a Greek—Popolis, who was kidnapped for ransom by the Moroccan bandit Rissuli. "Popolis alive or Rissuli dead!" was "Tully's" cabled ultimatum to the sultan. It worked that time. The sultan dug up the ransom himself. But there's no sultan to cable to now. An ultimatum might be served on Abdel-Krim, but the French and Spanish impression is that he's ultimatum proof.

Speaking of the sultan reminds the State Department of another experience with the same ruler. A Chicago private banker named Stensland had shipped with depositors' money. He turned up in Morocco.

The State Department asked for him. "No," said the sultan, "while his money lasts." There was no extradition with Morocco then. Assistant District Attorney (now Judge) Harry Olson of Chicago went over to see about it. He cultivated the sultan socially—became his warm friend, then he asked for Stensland—just as a friend. "As a sultan," replied the monarch, "we have our dignity to consider. We can't surrender him, but perhaps he'll go voluntarily."

And he ordered the Stensland looked up. Anybody who knows the inside of a Moroccan prison knows why, in a couple of days, the luxury of Joliet.

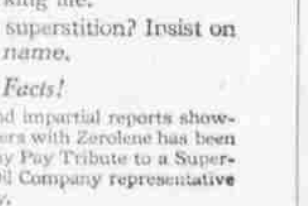
### COOPER FIND NEAR BAKER

**BAKER, Ore. (Special)**—Further developments in Baker county mining have come with the showing of an 18-foot ledge in the Bain creek tunnel at the Mother Lode Copper Mining company in the Powder river copper zone near Baker, where surface areas were revealed that averaged 65 per cent copper glance. This extends entirely across the ledge.

The gold showing in six trenches dug on the surface about 50 feet apart gave values of from \$2.40 to \$25 per ton. The Bain creek tunnel is being driven toward these ledges, and at present has 78 feet further to go.

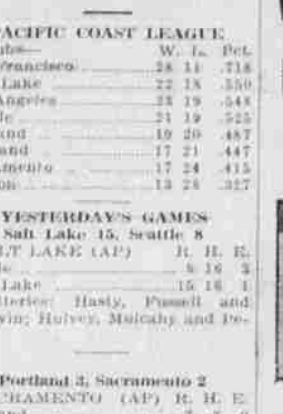

 But it doesn't prove out in practice—that this legend about salt as an aid to bird-catching. Neither does this superstition that there is something mysteriously "better" about eastern lubricants—merely because they cost more. Every quart of Zerolene you buy proves the groundlessness of this superstition.
