**EASY LESSONS IN AUCTION BRIDGE**

In any discussion as to the advisability of taking out partner's no-trump bid with a bid of two hearts or two spades, careful consideration should also be given to what the no-trump bidder should do. That is, if the dealer bids one no-trump second hand passes and the dealer's partner bids two hearts or spades, with what type of hand should the dealer bid two no-trump or pass? Any theory of the take-out that you may adopt is incomplete without a thorough understanding between partners as to the procedure dealer should follow subsequent to the take-out. The writer is of the opinion that if this procedure becomes thoroughly understood, there will not be the various differences of opinion as to the take-out. With a partner who understands what to do after a take-out, it is much easier to arrive at the best bid of the two hands. The purpose of the take-out, of course, is to bid a suit that offers a better chance for game than the no-trump. If, however, the original no-trump bidder still considers the no-trump offers a better chance for game, he should bid two no-trump. If you adopt this procedure it is much easier to take out the no-trump with any five card major suit. Such a bid gives that information to partner and if he doesn't consider it the best bid for game, he should bid two no-trump. Such procedure can never do any harm and in many hands will enable partner to make a game not otherwise possible.

**DEPTH BOMB AND RADIO DETERMINE SHIP'S POSITION**

SAN PEDRO, CAL. (AP)—When the U. S. S. Guide, coast guard and geodetic survey ship engaged in charting the waters about San Clemente, San Nicolas and Santa Catalina Islands, off southern California, wants to know the bearing in a hurry, it throws a TNT bomb into the sea and lets radio do the rest.

The explosive system of getting quick and accurate bearings was worked out by Lieutenant Commander T. J. Morrow, captain of the Guide, in his search for some method by which bearings could be taken without delaying the ship's operating operations and which yet would be faster than radio compass, visual triangulation by dead reckoning.

He built two radio stations on San Clemente Island, one on each side, connecting each with a hydrophone in the ocean nearby. With the distance between these hydrophones known, the Guide has one side of a triangle already on which to base calculations. By noting the time it takes the noise of a TNT bomb to travel to each of the "listening" hydrophones, from which it is relayed instantly back to the ship by radio, the Guide's navigator can compute in an instant the distance of each hydrophone from the ship, thus giving him three sides of a triangle with which to plot his position.

**OREGON CLAIMS ISLAND.**

SALEM, Ore.—Failure of the government to utilize Sand Island L. in the Columbia river, near Astoria, for military purposes as proposed in a deed for the land associated in favor of the government in 1924, resulted in an order by the state land board soliciting proposals for the leasing of the island. The bids will be considered by the land board May 27th.

Members of the board charge that after the government received a deed to the island it was not utilized for military purposes but was loaned to private fishing interests.
