## Sister Mary's Kitchen

**Breakfast**—Baked rhubarb with raisins, scrambled eggs with rice, crisp Graham toast, milk, coffee.

**Luncheon**—Asparagus soufflé, eye bread and butter sandwiches, cottage cheese with strawberry preserves, milk, tea.

**Dinner**—Roast veal, potatoes roasted with meat, creamed spinach, pineapple and cabbage salad, strawberry pie, whole wheat rolls, milk, coffee.

If you make your own cottage cheese, be sure it is very dry, that all the whey is drained off. Then season it lightly with salt and pepper and a few gratings of nutmeg. Fold the cheese into half as much whipped cream as there is cheese and chill before serving. With strawberries preserves or bar in due course you have a dish fit for the gods. And more than that, cottage cheese is an excellent food for children.

**Fighting Driver Sentenced**

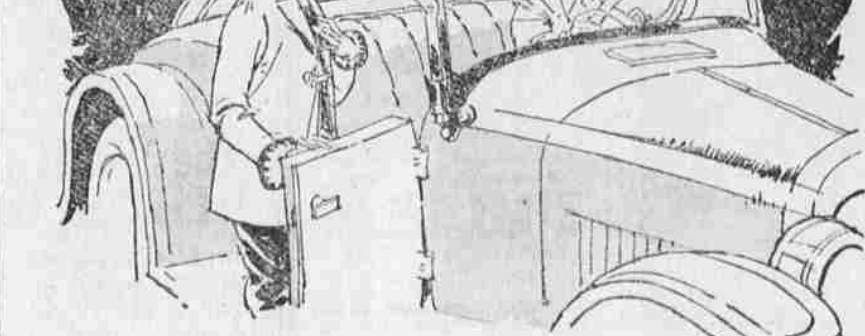

## Hints for the Housewife

NUTRITIOUS MEALS FROM OUR LAKES AND RIVERS

There is, at present, an available variety of fresh fish which should be given a prominent place on the spring menus. Fish is not only an appetizing change from the heavier meat dishes of the cold months, but possesses a splendid dietetic value as well.

Fish steamed and baked makes a very hearty and palatable dinner.

Make the stuffing for the fish by soaking two cupsful of stale white bread in cold water for ten minutes. Then squeeze dry and crumble to bits. To this add a tablespoonful of minced parsley, a tablespoonful of chopped onion, one quarter teaspoonful of pepper, half a teaspoonful of salt, two tablespoonfuls of melted butter and a well beaten egg yolk. Clean the fish and fill the body—not too full, as the filling will swell slightly during the cooking. Sew up the opening, place in a well buttered enameled ware baking pan and arrange strips of bacon on the fish, fastening them with toothpicks or skewers. Put in a hot oven and allow to simmer pour in a cupful of tomato juice, the acid of which will not affect the surface of the enameled ware dish. Bake the fish forty minutes, basting it occasionally with the liquid in the pan. Just before removing from the oven sprinkle the surface with fine buttered crumbs and brown delicately. Serve it from the enameled dish in which it baked so that the individual servings are made at the table. Garnish with sliced lemon.

**Prime Growers Not Discouraged**
