## JURISTS NOT IN FAVOR OF LATE PARDON

In his letter to Mr. Pierce.  
"Under the circumstances I think it would be an outrage upon justice for executive clemency to be extended to Gauthier, it ought also to be extended to his co-conspirator, Butler, who is now serving a sentence for the commission of a similar crime against another young girl."  
"Under the circumstances I cannot recommend that executive clemency be extended to Floyd Gauthier."

Other remarks made by Mr. Knowles in his letter to the governor included: "If executive clemency is extended to Gauthier, it ought also to be extended to his co-conspirator, Butler, who is now serving a sentence for the commission of a similar crime against another young girl."  
"Under the circumstances I cannot recommend that executive clemency be extended to Floyd Gauthier."

Mr. Green Objects  
Mr. Green, special prosecutor of the case, also entered an objection in a letter to the governor. Excerpts follow: "I personally would have no objection to recommending a pardon after the defendant had served a reasonable time, and I am not requesting or insisting on the full ten-year penalty, but I do think that considering the great expense and the tax to Union county in the trial of this case as a whole, that it would be a travesty on justice to turn the defendant loose after he has been found guilty and the case affirmed by the supreme court by an individual court."  
"I understand that the statement has been made that the defendant denies his guilt. If there is any doubt in your mind about this, I would ask that you read the record, which is very short. The original testimony is on file in the records of the supreme court."  
"While the sentences given by the court are heavy, yet you yourself are undoubtedly to some extent familiar with the condition existing in Old Town of La Grande prior to this trial. These girls lived in that part of town and I have often heard the remark that those two convictions did more to clean up things there than anything that had happened for years."

Wright's Denial  
Another letter written by Mr. Green states: "I understood from one of your letters that Ed Wright recommended a pardon. I have talked to Ed Wright personally while here at Hot Lake and he absolutely denies recommending a pardon, but states that he recommended a reduction in the sentence to around one year. Now, governor, there is absolutely no justification
