## Aliens' Registration May Tighten Immigration Law

CHICAGO (AP).—The subcommittee on selective immigration of the eugenics committee of the United States today announced its recommendations concerning alien entrance into the country, all of which have to do with the enforcement of existing laws, or with changes in those laws which the committee said could be made without altering the fundamental legislation already enacted. The report was made public here by Harry Olson, chief justice of the municipal courts, and a member of the committee.

"Our immigration laws should be strictly enforced," said the report, "and all borderline cases, which are mostly those liable to become public charges for medical reasons, should be debarred unless there is very strong evidence in favor of admission. Appeals from adverse decisions of the boards of special inquiry should rarely be sustained, and all appeal decisions should be based on evidence only, as the law intended, and not on personal representation or political influence.

"Aliens should no longer be admitted on bonds. They should either come in clear, or, if they are unfit, should not come in at all. The steamship companies

cases of deportation of insane or otherwise especially undesirable aliens should be issued by the commissioner of immigration or other responsible officer of the district in which the alien is a resident, sustained in the report, instead of being issued by the department in Washington.

"The secretary of labor should be directed in all cases where it is intended to cancel a warrant, or to suspend deportation, to give the officer issuing a certificate an opportunity to be heard, either in person or by letter, before final action is taken."

**Firemen and Engineers' Officers Seek Re-election**  
DETROIT (AP).—The thirtieth convention of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers will open here June 1, continuing for about a month, with representatives of 270 subordinate lodges and a score or more of grand officers in attendance. The convention will represent approximately 15,000 members.

Much of the time of the convention will be devoted to a study of its insurance department, through which there are at present in effect policies aggregating more than \$20,000,000.

All the grand officers will be candidates for re-election.

The Ladies' Auxiliary of the organization, with 443 lodges and a corresponding number of delegates, representing a membership of 21,000 also convenes here June 1.

**Normal Plans Under Way.**  
SALEM, Ore.—Plans and specifications for the new normal school to be located in Ashland are being prepared, according to J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of public instruction. Mr. Churchill returned from Ashland, where he conferred with the architect. The plant will cost approximately \$175,000 and probably will be ready for use early next year.

**Leaving Railroad Begins**  
MARSHFIELD, Ore.—Work commenced on the Great Northern railroad on South street, three miles from the county bridge. The contracting firm received a shipment of machinery and a crew was put to work on the first of the grading. The road of 2 1/2 miles is to be finished by September 1.

**Chinook in Unpqua scarce.**  
MARSHFIELD, Ore.—Packers and fishermen on the Unpqua river who operate at Hoodport are wondering what retards the chinook season which opened May 15. Reports say there has been no run of any importance and some believe the season was over and the fish had passed by, or returned to sea, although it is well known salmon do not return to the ocean after entering the fresh water, at least in any quantity. The packers and fishermen, however, report good catches of shad. Crabs are plentiful and the fishermen are making good returns in this line.
