LICENSE CONTRACT GIVEN

PALESTINE, Ore.—The contract for furnishing the 1926 motor vehicle license plates was awarded to the Irwin-Hodson company of Portland. The contract calls for 250,000 pairs of plates for passenger cars, 15,000 pairs of truck plates, 250 pairs of motorcycle plates, 700 pairs of dealer plates and 15,000 chauffeur badges. The motor vehicle license plates will cost the state \$1,257, a pair and the badges will cost 11 cents each. The license plates for the current year cost the state \$1,247 a pair. The 1926 license plates will have a black background with white figures and letters.
