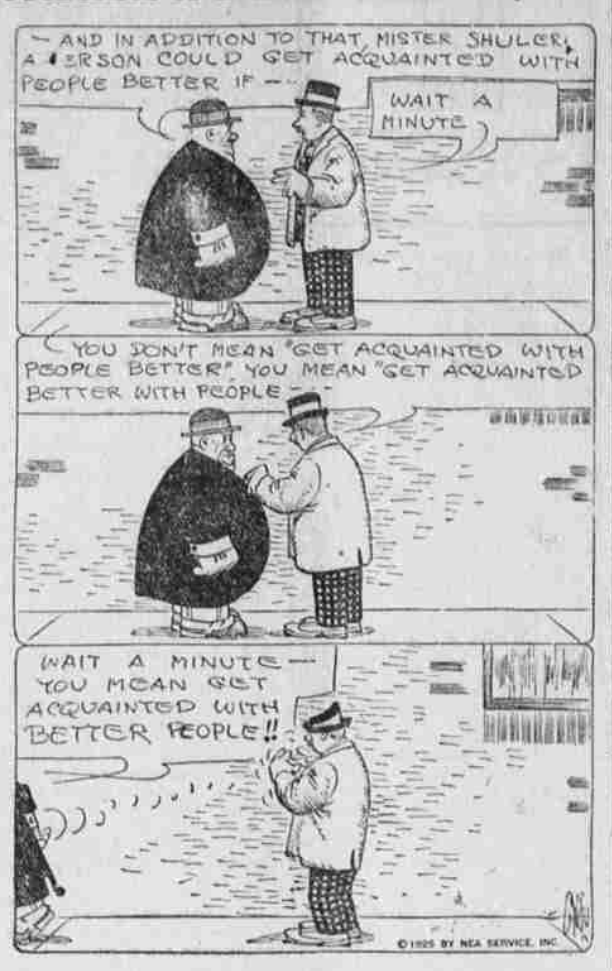

**Frederick with La Plante Star in New Picture.**

"The bigger they are the harder they fall" is an apt description of the prize ring.

"The older they are the harder they fall" is the conversation of the aphorism that might be used to describe "Smouldering Fires," Universal-Jewel-Clarens Brown production to be shown in the Arcade Theatre commencing today.

Pauline Frederick and Laura La Plante are co-starred in the pictures and the reference to aphorisms will be understood when it is learned that Miss Frederick takes the part of a middle-aged woman, who after years devoted solely to business affairs falls in love with a youth half her age, and, to return to the vernacular, falls hard!

Malcolm McGregor has the leading role in the picture and others prominently cast are Tully Marshall, Nevada Hawley, Helen Lynch and George Cooper. Several widely known character actors also contribute to the entertainment of the picture although their parts are minor to the main story. They are Robert Roach, Billy Gould, Rolfe Sedan, Jack McDonald, William Ortmond, Robert Mack and Fred Newberg, all players in motion picture work.

"Smouldering Fires" is an original story written expressly for Miss Frederick and Miss La Plante by Sada Cowan and Howard Higgins, who have collaborated to write some of the outstanding screen successes of recent years.

The opening scenes show Miss Frederick as a stern, dynamic woman, president and active manager of a big factory which she has directed ever since the death of

her father. Other than the affairs of the factory she has no interest in life, unless it be love for her younger sister, played by Miss La Plante. Many of the early scenes were filmed in the working rooms of a real factory, one of the biggest of its kind on the Pacific Coast, where dozens of women operate machines.

## New Carey Film at Sherrys Is Virile Drama.

"Beyond the Border," the new Harry Carey picture which is the feature this week at the Sherry Theatre and delighted the audience last night at its premiere, gives you a first hand look at a local election with all its intrigues, drinking, shooting and whatnot. No one who has ever lived in a Main street town will gainsay that the realism as it appears in the Hunt Stromberg production is a faithful reproduction of an election in a typical one-horse town.

But this scene is only one instance in which the entire action drama attains verity. The entire production holds a clear mirror to human nature and from the side down to the Indian woman who has only one line, the actors give honest characterizations.

Carey, as a hard riding, fast shooting officer of the law who believes his prisoner because he believes the boy is not bad at heart but merely the tool of some rascal, gives a rugged, tense portrayal and by sheer force of his profound, historic ability carries over to a glorious climax a story which does not depend, as do so many westerns, merely on fast riding and plenty of shooting.

Mildred Harris as the heroine is more abnormally beautiful than ever and she virtually permeated the entire film with her gentle charm and soft appeal. Her could not ask for a lovelier screen personality, and in 2 hours or off one she is equally delightful.

The film is a screen version of Meredith Davis' magazine story, "When Smith Meets Smith," adapted to the screen by Harvey Gates who proved by the finished product that he was entirely capable of the job. Though the action of the

story is always rapid and though the tense situations would seem to absorb every ounce of attention, one finds that he does take account of the unusual backgrounds against which the story is set and one cannot but remark on the perfection of the photography.

**Norway to Honor Soldier Who Lost Life in Civil War**

OSLO, Norway (AP)—A monument to the memory of Norwegian General Hans Hegg, the Norwegian commander of the Fifteenth Wisconsin regiment who fell at the battle of Chancellorsville, will be unveiled here this summer during the celebration of the centenary of the first Norwegian immigration to the United States.

The statue is to be erected in the township of Lien, the birthplace of Hegg. The celebration takes place in July and will be attended by King Haakon.
