Clackamas has Jubilee OREGON CITY, Or.—The Clackamas county Jersey jubilee was held at the Clackamas county fairgrounds near Danby in connection with the Oregon Jersey jubilee, which is moving from place to place in the dairy sections of western Oregon this week. Nearly 500 persons attended the affair and 25 thoroughbred Jersey cattle were placed on exhibit and entered for prizes at the judging, which was conducted by J. W. McGilvray of Chilliawack, Canada, prominent Jersey breeder and judge of dairy animals.

The morning was given over to the display and judging of stock and at noon the Warner grange of the New Era served lunch to the gathering. Following the exhibition of the judging in the afternoon address were made by dairymen of the northwest and others.

Co-ordination is sought.

HOOD RIVER, Or.—While no definite plans have been announced as to reconstruction of the plant of the Hood River Apple Vinegar company, destroyed by fire here Sunday, May 18, with a loss in excess of \$175,000, a movement has been launched to bring about co-ordination of all concerns located here and engaged in the manufacture of orchard supplies or utilization of small fruits or cull apples.

If the plants situated can be brought to materialization, it is said, single crews can be used throughout the year for operation of various departments. Central boiler stations can be utilized and elimination of much overhead expense is expected.

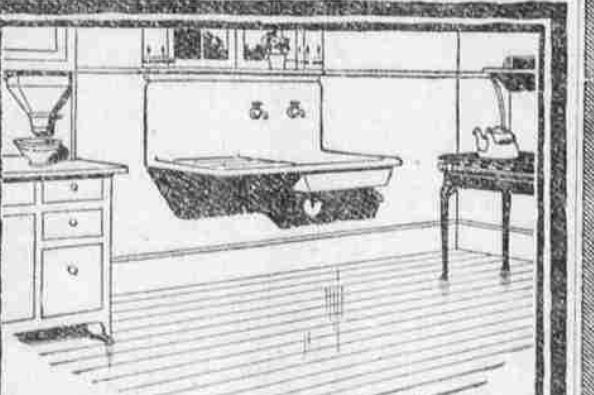
BATTLES WAY TO EDUCATION
