Mariner Quits Farm to Sail Alone for England

VANCOUVER, B. C. (AP).—Commander Eustace H. Maude, 77 years old and long retired from the Royal navy, is going to sea again, this time in a 25-foot dory-type sloop in which is plans to sail from Vancouver or Victoria to England by way of the Panama Canal. He is now preparing for the cruise at his home on Mayne Island, and expects to get under way within a month.

"I expect to enjoy myself very much," said the veteran mariner. "It will be a long voyage, but it should be pleasant. I will head far out to sea after passing Cape Flattery, pick up the trade winds and boom down the coast with the wheel lashed and canvas taught. I have provisions for 100 days and a complete edition of Shakespeare's works, so I will get along very well."

Farming and Industry Draw Stage Actors

BERLIN, (AP)—Hard times on the stage have driven not a few German actors and singers to take up other occupations, and on the whole they seem to be happier and better off. Seven stage celebrities have recently become cafe and restaurant owners and four others have turned to industry and commerce. Farming has also attracted a number of stage favorites.

Richard Schütz, one time manager of the Metropolitan Theatre in Berlin, has become a Bavarian farmer. Otto Sommerer and his wife Therasia, formerly the ideal Romeo and Juliet of the German stage, have retired to a country place near the village of Raiten in the Alps. The former Romeo is devoted much of his time to writing, and Juliet is filling the office of president of the farms' union of her village with much success.

Rosa Poppe, once a star of the Royal Theatre in Berlin, married Dr. Leva and is devoting her time to the cultivation of fruit at Brinsgaro, Switzerland. Rudolph Bittling, who won fame as interpreter of roles in Goshart Hauptmann plays, has bought a little estate in Agnetendorf, Upper Silesia, and is occupied with mixed farming.

Hans Grogot, founder of the Comic Opera, of Berlin, who married an American woman and became a farmer in the United States, likes rural life so well that he recently refused to accept an offer to come to Germany and reorganize the tangled affairs of the Berlin private opera houses.

Similar feats, Commander Maude regards his plans in a matter-of-fact way and seems to think them not at all extraordinary. He will sail only once during the long voyage at Panama, and during practically the rest of the journey he will be out of sight of land. He intends to make his course with the use of his old nautical instruments. He has dug them out of his chest and burnished them anew. In though the commander hopes to cover the entire journey by sail, besides provisions, he is taking 50 gallons of fresh water and 50 gallons of gasoline.

GRADE PUPILS UPON EQUALITY

OXFORD, Eng. (AP).—The American system of education, with its arrangement of yearly grades or classes extending up from the primary schools to the senior year in college, finds little favor among English teachers and university authorities. In English public schools the form system which puts promotion upon equality of work done rather than on years of attendance, is considered to give satisfactory results, while, in the universities the American classification of freshmen, sophomores, juniors, seniors and post-graduate is unknown.

Sir Michael Sadler, president of University colleges, and a noted English educator, has recently criticized the class system of school organization on the ground that under it a boy who does not begin his schooling early enough or in the approved manner "misses the train" and necessarily is never able to catch up. Oxford, certainly in free from this criticism, he said, as a considerable number of the students admitted have been under tutors and have never attended any variety of school.

The disadvantages of a strictly organized class system of schools and colleges are well illustrated. It was pointed out by the career of Joseph Wright, M. A., Ph. D., LL. D., Litt. D., F. R. S., until recently the Oxford professor of comparative philology. Dr. Wright was born in a one-room Yorkshire cottage for which a weekly rental of ten pence was paid, and at the age of six was working for thirty cents a week. He never attended a school, but at 13 he taught himself to read, and in the seven years following he taught himself Latin, Greek, French and German. To these he later added Sanskrit, Old Bulgarian, Old Norse and Icelandic, old and modern High German, Lithuanian and Russian.

With these qualifications Dr. Wright was readily received into the university world, and in 1881 he succeeded the great Max Müller in the Oxford professorship and brought out the scholarly and comprehensive English dictionary. He also produced standard primers and grammars of Gothic, Greek, middle and old High German and old English. The value of his researches were recognized by the crown, and, after the ancient fashion, he was provided with a government grant or civil list pension of about \$1000 a year.

Big Demand for Zoo Animals in Europe

LONDON, (AP)—The demand for wild animals of various parts of the world has been greater this spring than in 15 or 20 years owing to the desire of numerous continental cities to replace the stocks in their zoological gardens which were depleted during the war.

Moscow, among other far away points, has come into the market for various specimens. The Soviet authorities have announced intentions to reopen the zoo in the Russian capital which had been closed since the revolution. The Russians desire particularly jungle beasts and birds of plumage not procurable in their own country.

Riga, Latvia, which had an enormous zoo prior to the war, has also begun buying animals in foreign markets to replenish the supply which had begun to disappear eight or nine years ago when the food situation in her war stricken areas was at its worst.

England has come to the front this year as a rival of Germany in the importation of zoo animals, this country now being better pre-
