SNOW MELTING NEAR WALLOWA

WALLOWA, Ore. (Special).—The large amount of rainfall and warm weather during the past two weeks has caused the snow in the mountains to melt rapidly. The river was very high for several days the past week.

H. L. Fisher and W. M. Hunter, farmers near Lostine, have each ordered a Case combine harvester, to be used in harvesting their large acreage of wheat this season.

Farmers in all parts of the country are back in the fields again, following the heavy rains of the first of the week. The ground is still very wet in many of the fields, but as some spring seedling has not yet been finished, farmers are very anxious to complete this. The plowing of stubble is going forward rapidly. The weeds and volunteer grain is growing rapidly on the unplowed fields, and in many places is so big it is difficult to cover with the plow.

The cemetery association here has designated Wednesday, May 27th, as clean-up day of the cemetery. The cooperation of the community is asked in order to get the work taken care of in a satisfactory manner. Those having lots are requested to have their cleaned up previous to the general cleanup.
