**WEEKLY GRAIN MARKETS**  
 WASHINGTON (AP)—Grain exports from the United States last week were 2,759,000 bushels as compared with 2,238,000 bushels the previous week.

Commerce department figures Monday gave the following comparisons between last week's exports and those of the previous week:

Wheat, 1,526,000 bushels against 2,218,000; rye, 459,000 against 1,032,000; oats, 265,000 against 1,270,000; corn, 111,000 against 135,000; barley, 302,000 against 483,000.

Canadian grains exported through the United States ports were 2,754,000 bushels against 2,709,000 bushels. Flour exports from the United States ports were 123,909 barrels against 274,000.

 with the Calumet Gas and Electric company, then the Northern Indiana Gas and Electric company, then the Indiana Hydro-Electric company, the Interstate Power Service company, Indiana and Michigan Electric company, and to the south with the Indiana Power company, and into Kentucky by a connection with the Kentucky Utilities company, the Kentucky Hydro-Electric company, and the Louisville Gas and Electric company.

North of Chicago the super-power lines connect with the Wisconsin Power and Light company lines and those of the Southern Wisconsin Electric company, with other connections extending into Minnesota.

**\$200,000,000 Investment**  
 The great system is carried across the Mississippi river at East St. Louis, Ill. and St. Louis, Mo., and continues half way across the state of Missouri.

Nowhere else in the world is interconnection carried to that extent, and the Insull interests debate the claims of Switzerland to the greatest system in the world. Some electric lines possibly carry heavier voltages, but nowhere has such a pool of power been created. The pool represents an investment of more than \$200,000,000.

**Pipeline Springs Leak.**
