CLUB ADOPTS STRICT RULES

The management of the country club has experienced considerable difficulty in the past with boys entering onto the grounds, picnic grounds and swimming tank without permission and making general nuisances of themselves, according to a country club official. He states that a number of cases have come up where they have refused to leave even when ordered to do so by the persons in charge of the grounds.

Since the closing of school this condition has again become acute and twice in the last week the keeper has had trouble with the boys who are old enough to know what is right, he declares.

The club has determined that steps must be taken to protect its property and an application has been made to the sheriff to have E. A. Morris, in charge of the club grounds, appointed a deputy sheriff and the club officials have instructed him to arrest any person or boy who persists in entering the club grounds without permission or who violates the club property.

The club official further reports that it has been decided that any boy who goes up to the club house to cadge will be required to stay on the grounds near the club house until wanted and will not be allowed to go around on the links or to enter the swimming tank or picnic grounds. "If this rule is not observed they will be forbidden to come on the grounds under any consideration," he concluded.
