Luncheon — Baked macaroni with cheese, bran and raisin bread sandwiches, steamed tomatoes, jelly roll cake, milk, tea.

Dinner — Stewed chicken, mashed potatoes, French string beans, jellied cream salad, rhubarb tapioca pudding, rye bread, milk, coffee.

Long Hikes to Work Lessen Efficiency of Laborers

GENEVA, (AP)—The International Labor Conference, endeavoring to give workers the undiminished enjoyment of their spare time, has recommended that public and private transport authorities cooperate with workers' organizations to the end that the laborer be moved to his job, and home again, as quickly as possible.

It has been shown that the frequency of illness and accidents increases with the distance of the workers' homes from the works and that this frequency was at its maximum for those workers whose homes were furthest away.

Oregon Is Due June 16.
SALEM, Ore.—Members of the battleship Oregon committee will leave here for Bremerton today to arrange to have the old fighting craft transferred to Portland harbor.

The battleship has been conditioned by the federal government and will be towed to Oregon waters by two tugs. Six days will be required to complete the voyage.

Present plans call for the arrival of the battleship in Portland on June 16.

Railway to Poison Squirrels

RUGENE, Or.—One hundred and thirty pounds of poisoned bait was delivered by O. S. Fletcher county agricultural agent to the Southern Pacific company which will poison gray digger squirrels on the company's right of way in this county. This amount will be used on all lines except on the main line north of Irving and Coos Bay line, which sections are out of the jurisdiction of the local roadmaster. Efforts will be made to place the poison on these sections also.

CURING GOOD HAY FACTOR
Successful hay curing in Oregon depends on getting the surplus moisture dried out rapidly with the least loss of leaves and fine parts. Cutting hay while it has plenty of green leaf surface and nitrogen in the plants is recommended by the experiment station. Over ripe hay with the seed fully formed and ripened has a large loss of leaves which materially lessens its feeding value. The palatability is decreased and the market price lowered. The experiment station is co-operating with the United States department of agriculture in the development of new hay grades.
