Alan Helffrich Wins Race from Paavo Nurmi

YANKEE STADIUM, New York (AP)—Paavo Nurmi, super athlete, went down to defeat Tuesday night in his last American appearance before Alan Helffrich, Penn State product, over a distance of a half mile.

Twenty thousand track fans cheered Helffrich as he bore to victory, lengthening his lead as he sped down the stretch. When he crossed the finish line a full 10 yards in front of Nurmi, forcing himself to the greatest pace for the first time, the throng surrounded the conqueror.

It was not a great race but it was interesting. Nurmi, Helffrich and John Barnes of New York, started and Barnes led them through the first lap. Nurmi stepping ahead of the American at the first turn.

Helffrich came down the stretch like a sprinter, a sport which his opponents could not equal.

Victor at every distance from three-quarters of a mile to 1 1/2 miles, Nurmi showed Tuesday that the half mile wherein a burst of speed at the end is necessary is not for him.

The Olympic champion will sail for home on Thursday with his one defeat against a marvelous record built up in scores of races from Maine to California.

Helffrich's time for the distance was 1:36 4-5, somewhat behind the record of 1:32 1-5 set by Ted Meredith in 1916.

BERLENBACH FAVORED TO WIN MCTIGUE'S CROWN

NEW YORK (AP)—Many boxing fans expect that a new light heavyweight king will be crowned at the Yankee stadium Friday night.

In spite of the statement that Mike McTigue, titleholder, has wagered \$5000 he will stop his challenger, the hard swinging Paul Berlenbach, Berlenbach is an 8 to 1 favorite. Musket injury to children and grown-ups may be successfully treated by use of sweetened potato spray. If application is made at once the experiment station suggests. The formula is sodium arsenate 1 ounce, sugar 1 quart, and water 2 gallons. This is sprayed lightly over the entire foliage, a few drops being enough for each leaf. Repeat the spray in 10 days. If sodium can not be had lead arsenate will do.
