## Sister Mary's Kitchen

Breakfast—Stewed dried apricots, cereal, coffee, cinnamon toast, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Port of chicken with rice, lettuce sandwiches, pineapple punch, plain cake, milk, tea.

Dinner—Browned lamb chops, creamed potatoes, butter, asparagus, radishes and celery, strawberry shortcake, coconut macaroons, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

Chicken left from stewed chicken is pounded and rubbed through a sieve, made moist with chicken stock and cream and served in a border of steamed rice. It's an excellent dish for small children, being both appetizing and nourishing.

While a child under school age may not eat radishes he may have finely minced celery. This with the lettuce in the lettuce sandwiches adequately supplies the uncooked daily green vegetables.

**Creamed Potatoes**  
Four cups sliced potatoes, 1 cup milk, 1 drop onion juice, 2 tablespoons flour, 1/2 cups milk, 1 egg yolk, salt and pepper, 1 tablespoon minced parsley.

The potatoes should be cut in half-inch slices. Drop into boiling water and boil four minutes. Drain. Add one-third cup of butter, cover and cook over a low fire for 20 minutes, until the potatoes are soft and slightly browned. Melt remaining butter, add onion juice and flour and stir until perfectly blended. Slowly add milk, stirring constantly. Season with salt and pepper and bring to the boiling point. Stir in egg yolk and pour over potatoes in a hot vegetable dish. Sprinkle with parsley and serve.

To make cream whip, a drop of glycerine is added to each pint of cream.

## Hints for the Housewife

A combination of carrots and green peas with a dressing of mayonnaise makes a delicious salad. Put the carrots through the coarse food chopper and add an equal amount of cooked green peas. Serve on a lettuce leaf, with a generous spoonful of mayonnaise.

A salad of dried prunes that have been cooked until tender but not soft is also good. Remove the pits and stuff the prunes with without. Serve on a lettuce leaf with cream dressing to which a generous amount of whipped cream has been added.

The best and most easily obtained article for cleaning glass bottles and vases is a handful of common cereal soaked with crushed egg shells. Put these with a little soap suds in the vessel to be cleaned and give it a few shakes and it is cleaned.

**American Vines Restore Stricken German Vineyards**  
MARIENTHAL, Germany. (AP)—American grapes may be called upon to restock the vineyards along the River Ahr, which flows into the Rhine north of Coblenz. A mysterious disease has seized the entire district, and has caused practically all the vines to die. The wine growers of the district have therefore begun to import and plant American vines.

The results already achieved have been so satisfactory that the wine growers' association has applied to the Prussian ministry of agriculture and to the Prussian diet to erect an experimental station. Both bodies assured the wine growers of the necessary support.

The mine, operation of which by the state began in 1919, is now on a profit-paying basis and producing in such quantities that its manager was able to offer prices which enabled almost all the institutions to use the coal at a saving.
